QUEBEC SELLS LARGE BOND ISSUE AT \$105 TO CANADIAN FIRMS

\$3,500,000 of Five-Year 6 Per Cent Securities Are Sold.

New York, March 19.—Local bond dealers received word this morning that the Provincial Government of Quebec has sold to a Canadian syndicate, headed by the Dominion Securities Corporation, and Wood & Gundy Company, \$3,500,000 of five-year 6 per cent bonds at a price to net the province \$3,250,000 and accrued interest in New York funds. At current exchange quotations this is equivalent to about \$105 in Canadian currency. The purpose of this new loan is to meet a loan of \$6,000,000 maturing here April 1 next, which was brought out in April, 1915, by the bank of Montreal, J. P. Morgan & Company, and Brown Bros & Co. The balance of \$2,500,000 will be raised from other sources.

DOMINION ALLIANCE SPEAKER DENOUNCES QUEBEC LIQUOR LAW

Montreal, March 19.—A vigorous denunciation of the manner in which the liquor law is administered in the province of Quebec was the gist of an address given by Thomas O. Woods this afternoon before the convention of the Dominion Alliance in the Emmanuel Church. Mr. Woods said the province of Quebec was "reeking with drunkenness." He also claimed that more liquor than ever was being sold, and that the Quebec Government was condoning the sale of beers and ales which contained a greater percentage of alcohol than was permitted by the provincial law.

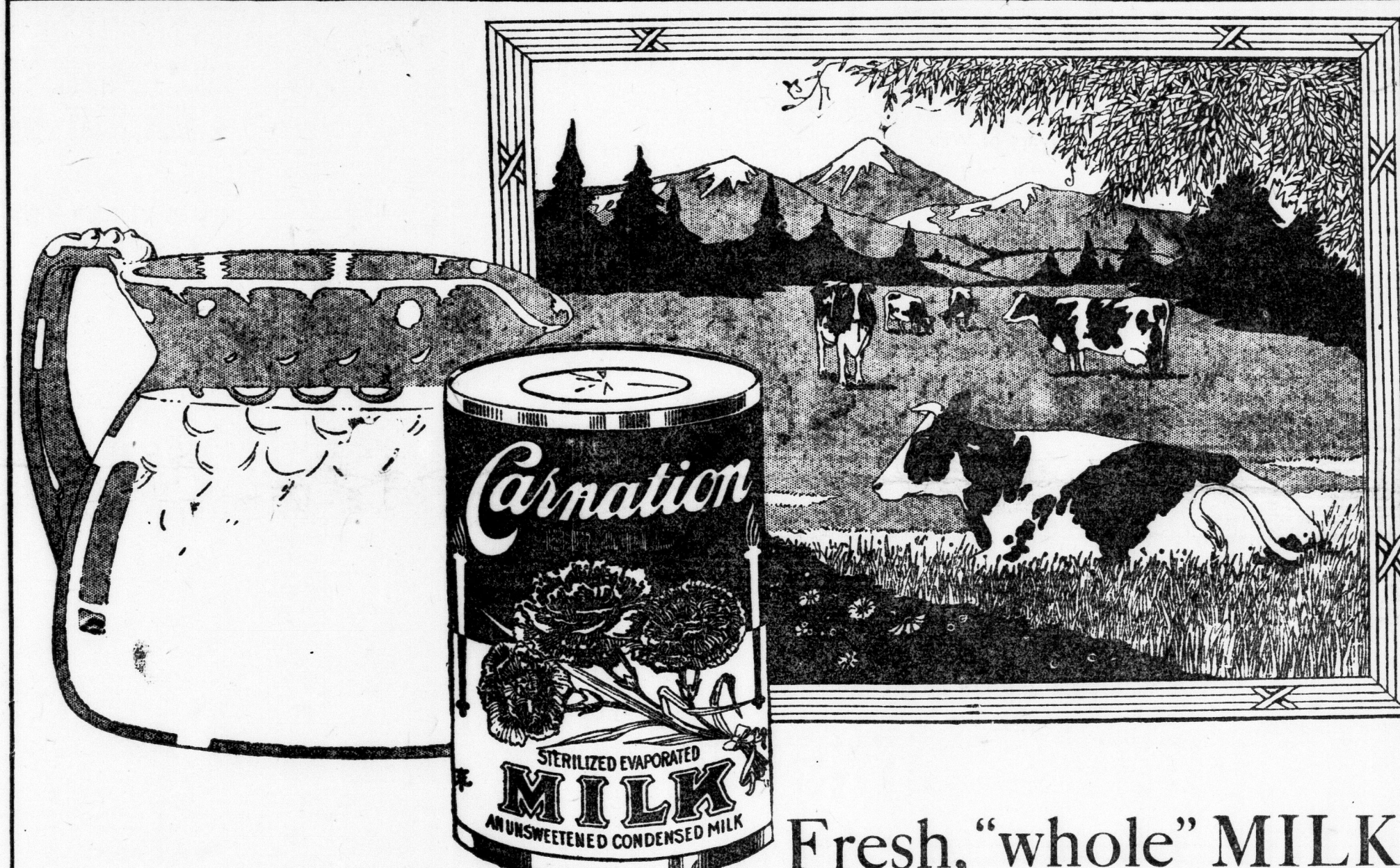
