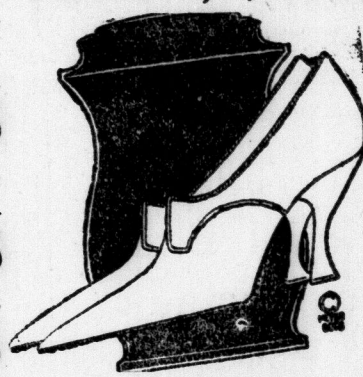

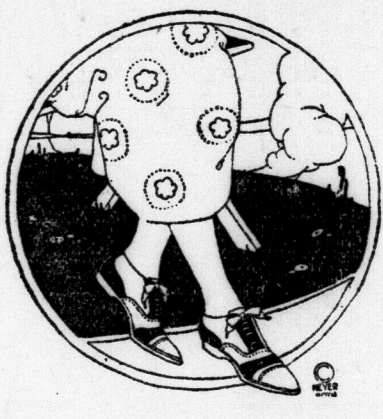

## FAVORS THREE HIGH SCHOOLS FOR THIS CITY

Provincial Inspector Rogers is Opposed To One Big Collegiate.

BUILDING FOR FUTURE

Personal Touch Between the Pupils and Teachers Must Not Be Destroyed.

Three high schools for London instead of one big central school were advocated today by Provincial Inspector G. F. Rogers, formerly principal of the collegiate.

"What the city really needs from the standpoint of the citizen who is interested in the growth of the city, as well as from the standpoint of the educational authorities, is a three-cornered arrangement, three units at strategic points, units which can be added to from time to time at a minimum cost," he stated. "One supervising principal would do for the three schools, with three teaching principals. These could easily be found on the present staff of the collegiate."

"Some people don't seem able to get away from the idea that everything must be centralized at the head office of Richmond and Dundas streets," he continued. "I can't for the life of me see one good argument in favor of the one big collegiate on the old site."

**Need Playground.**

"I see that the unique view is being advanced that 'collegiate students, being unfledged kindergarten, do not require playgrounds,' thought that the war had taught us the moral and intellectual value of physical training. I think I remember learning in my college days that the Greeks devoted one-third of their time to training the body. We are getting back to the Greek idea, and I foresee the time when at least as much attention will be paid to the physical training in our secondary schools as is now paid to the ground in Latin or the alimentary canal of a grasshopper."

Inspector Rogers' plan of a decentralized school is also favored by the other provincial high school inspectors. The board of education today warmly endorsed the plan and congratulated the board of education for having given the matter the consideration it deserves. The board of education is now planning to build a new school at one of the corners of the city instead of at one central point.

**Building for Future.**

"We know that they are giving the matter their most earnest attention, and I think it is right that it should be considered carefully before any action is taken. It should be remembered that they are building for the future, 20 or 30 years, and that matter should be looked at from that standpoint."

The central school might be built, but I doubt it very much. You would have to obtain special equipment for such a large building, and this would advance the costs. The chief argument that I see against the central school is that it is apt to destroy the personal touch with which exists between teachers and pupils. With a big central school, the students become merely names on a card index system and the principal of such a large institution

knows hardly any of them by name.

**Personal Touch.**

"Now children are not, clothesless to the students' homes. It is a pretty long distance for some boys and girls to come to the centre of the city every day. It would be much easier for them to attend a school in their district, and more of them might be induced to attend."

Also is the first occasion in the history of the university that the service of the public press has thus been officially recognized by honor being done its representatives.

**MUST CONSERVE CARS.**

Owing to a shortage in box-cars prevailing in all districts of the G. T. R., orders have been rescinded locally, from Montreal that the supply must be conserved to the utmost. Certain classes of grain cars must be used for transporting grain only, especially that for export. On no account must grain cars be loaded on other lines unless special permission has been granted.

No American cars are to be allowed to return to the United States while empty. If the G. T. R. cannot find it possible to load the cars they will be turned over to other Canadian roads requiring them.

**BOARD OF COMMERCE ORDERS QUESTIONNAIRE TO BE DISCONTINUED**

Ottawa, July 21.—(By the Canadian Press).—The board of commerce questionnaire to retail grocers has for the present been discontinued. Serious objection was taken in Parliament and elsewhere to this questionnaire as imposing on the trade a proportion too severe a burden in connection to the object in view.

"The board," says an official statement issued today, "after going carefully into the matter, has reached the view that the object sought by the questionnaire was wholly in the public interest, but that the immediate purpose of the issue of the questionnaire having been served its issue may now be safely suspended, satisfactory arrangements having been made by the board of commerce to secure, by other means, all necessary information respecting the grocery trade."

**NO CHANCE OF THE GOVT. GRANTING APPLICATIONS OF BACKUS INTERESTS**

Toronto, July 21.—"There is not the slightest chance in the world of the government granting the application of the Backus interests," said a member of the Drury cabinet today.

## FARMERS URGED TO KEEP COW RECORDS

Ontario Department Issues a Bulletin Pointing Out the Good Results.

For a long time human workers in many lines of industry have been paid by piecework, instead of a fixed salary basis, with the employer trusting them to give good service for the money. Timekeepers and labor-checkers are needed for ever so many workers in every large factory but it is an innovation to install a similar system in a cow-stable. Heretofore, Old Boss, Bluebell, Angus Bay and Brindley Bess have done the same salary in pressed clover blooms, 6 per cent onilage and bran flakes, as Mooley Nell and Durham Daisy. They were all on their honor to give as many quarts as they could, with no fear or favor to influence their conduct. But now all this is going to be changed.

A neat little circular issued by the dairy branch of the Ontario department of agriculture, and which has been received by the Western Ontario Dairy Exchange, advocates bookkeeping for every farmer. The circular is entitled "Why Should the Milk of the Individual Cow Be Weighed and Tested, and Records Kept?"

It makes quite clear that the loss on a poor cow may offset the profits on a good cow and advocates Dolbear treatment for the cow that does not earn her hay-checks. Judging from the arguments advanced in this circular, a record of cow records would result in a contribution from each of a great many dairies in the province sufficient to oversupply the market and bring down the price of beef.

**MAY GET ALONG WITHOUT UNIONS**

Labr conditions as affecting the building industry showed no new developments today. The hodcarriers are still on strike, but the bricklayers and carpenters are awaiting instructions and advice from their international officers before taking any definite stand in the matter of helping the hodcarriers to break the deadlock now existing between the union and the Builders' Exchange.

Within the past few days reports of slackness in several local factories have been current, and a few men have been laid off. Labor organizers, however, state that locally, at least, this has no particular significance nor relation to the attitude of labor and capital towards each other. The hodcarriers have made advances to have the strike settled by the local industrial council, but the Builders' Exchange has informed that the employers have made what they consider a fair offer to the strikers, and do not care to proceed with further negotiations.

The only offer made by the contractors was 55 cents an hour, with the option of a nine-hour day. As the contractors have secured along somehow without the union hodcarriers for over three weeks, the refusal by the Builders' Exchange to take the matter to arbitration is expected should Thompson's theory prove correct.

## SECRET SESSIONS OF LEAGUE OF NATIONS COURT MAY BE HELD

All Decisions, Though, Will Be Read To Public.

The Hague, July 21.—Secrecy may envelop the proceedings of the high court of nations in certain cases unless the League of Nations council changes the plans which already have been virtually approved by the jurists' commission in drafting the plan for the tribunal. In the main the sub-committee of the jurists has decided to follow the five-power plan submitted by the five neutral nations for the proceedings of the high court, but has inserted a clause providing that, while generally the proceedings before the court shall be public, one of the parties may demand that these be held in secret and that the court shall have direction in certain cases involving some special diplomatic interests.

All decisions, however, are to be read at public sessions. In the event that a charge is brought by one party before the court, the other interested parties and all the members of the League of Nations are to be informed of it. While some of the jurists think this means that publicity inevitably will follow, there is no official provision to give the press or the public access to briefs or complaints.

**SYRIAN KING SAID TO HAVE ACCEPTED FRENCH ULTIMATUM**

London, July 21.—A dispatch from Egypt to the French authorities here today says it is reported that Emir Feisal, head of the Syrian state, has accepted the terms of the French ultimatum. There has not as yet, however, been any official confirmation of this report.

**FIFTY-ONE COUNTRIES ARE REPRESENTED AT COMMUNIST CONGRESS**

London, July 21.—Fifty-one countries are represented at the Second International Communist Congress which opened at Petrograd July 19, says a wireless message from Moscow. Among the numerous delegates are two from Great Britain.

**TORONTO BOYS ARE HELD.**

St. Catharines, July 21.—Four Toronto boys were given a hearing before Magistrate Higgins at Beamsville yesterday on charges of burglary and attempted theft of two automobiles. The boys were remanded to the county jail for a week. The boys freely admitted that they broke into Mrs. Dick's store here last Friday night. They had been living in a boathouse near the old Welland Canal.

They gave the names of Ray Stevens, John Glynn, Frank Egerton and L. Hutchinson.

## NOVA SCOTIA COAL MINERS DEMAND AN INCREASE IN WAGES

Case Is Submitted Before the Royal Commission At Sydney.

Sydney, N. S., July 21.—An increase of one dollar per day for all daily pale men, and 24 cents per ton for other classes, was the wage increase asked by the United Mine Workers before a royal commission at Glace Bay. A demand that all pushing of boxes except in pitching seams be stopped, was put forward, and in such cases an increase of five cents per ton be paid the men engaged in that occupation.

"Lack of air pressure" in certain collieries was complained of. The request that the men be compensated for time lost when the mines are closed down was also made.

No decision will be handed down by the board at the district sittings, but after the hearings have been completed in each district, a general conference will be held and the larger questions discussed.

**PLOT TO BRING ON MOSLEM UPRISING IS NIPPED IN BUD**

Official of Entente Power Said To Be Implicated.

Constantinople, July 20.—(By the Associated Press).—Wholesale arrests were made here today in connection with an alleged plot to promote a general uprising of Moslems against foreign occupation.

The confession of one plotter is reported to have implicated high officials of one of the Entente powers in the alleged conspiracy, which was directed chiefly against the British.

**CHINESE MILITARISTS OFFER TO CAPITULATE**

Peking, July 19.—Peace terms, amounting to complete capitulation of the military party, have been offered by Gen. Tuan Chi Jui, the army commander, it was stated here today. The terms are being communicated to the leaders of the Chihli faction.
