

Retail milk prices in London have not taken the anticipated advance mooted for July. A joint meeting of the pro-ducers, wholesalers and retailers, held about a month ago in the department of agriculture offices, failed to arrive at ity. any agreement which would facilitate an advance in retail prices, but hopes were expressed at the time that de-velopments might arise which would decided upon in Toronto. The grounds on which the price of milk is generally advanced in July and August that the cows give less of the lacteal fluid when the pasture and water is less plentiful. Also there were some hopes held out of the cheese market assuming a brisker turn, with an increased demand for milk. The cheese market stands just about where it was then, and abundance of rain has encouraged plenty of green pasture, with ample water supply.
