TO STRAIGHT HYDRO MEN ARE ELECTED TO COUNCIL

Bailey and Cooper Are Elected to the Board of Control—All the Bylaws Carried.

HAMILTON, Jan. 3.—(Special.)—The results of the municipal elections today place two hydro men out of four on the board of control, and eight straight hydro men out of 21. Politically the council is divided into 15 Conservatives and 11 Liberals. Had it not been for the license reduction agitation and the great number of hydro candidates, amongst whom the vote

was split up, the hydro would have made a clean sweep. This is the order in which the board of control candidates ran, the first four being elected: Bailey 4238, Cooper 4148, Gardner 3956, Allan 3624, Lees 3414, Peregrine 3236, Quinn 2988, Findlay 2949, Jutten 1933, Wright 1781, Sweeney 1772, Miller 1650, Mahony 252.
