Before Making Man Prove Ownership of Ore.

OTTAWA, Feb. 23 .- (Special.) -- In the senate to-day, Sir Richard Scott submitted amendments to the bill making it an offence for a man to have gold or silver ore in his possession without being able to satisfactorily ex-plain their origin. The amendments were made to meet objections that the bill was too drastic.

The amendment provides that there must be reasonable ground for the suspicion that the ore was stolen, that the act shall only have effect in districts specified by the governor-general in Canada, and that prosecution cannot be instituted by any one, but only on the comlaint of the manager or director of a mining company or by a mine owner. Progress was reported on the bill.




