British sailors and marines have occupied two more German seaports yesterday under threat of bombardment. The town thus occupied are Salsam, Kijiva and Kijwa Kiswamb, 150 and 175 miles south of Dar-es-Salaam. On the Roumanian-Bulgarian front, the Roumanians, under hostile pressure, have evacuated Turtukai. A collision in this region between the Teutons and Slavs is imminent, for a strong Russian army is coming down Bulgaria and European Turkey. To the west of the Russian line of approach the Germans and Bulgarians are attempting to invade Roumania in an endeavor, if possible, to fight it out on Roumanian territory. On the Roumanian-Transylvanian front the Austrians have been forced to evacuate Dorna Watra, 20 miles west of the Roumanian border, and to take up their position on the heights of Olah Toplitza, south of that town.

British warships are engaged against the enemy on the coast of Greece and have shelled Bulgarian positions near the shore. Otherwise the campaign appears to lag.

In the Caucasus the Russians are continuing their offensive operations with considerable success. They also defeated a Turkish drive towards Erzincan, from the upper Euphrates River.

Dr. Hunter Wants Russian Language Substituted for That of Enemy.

Board of education trustees are rapidly developing a "speed craze." The inaugural meeting for the new school year in the city hall last night was conducted with such a zest that an adjournment was made soon after 9 o'clock. Nevertheless, the members accomplished a good deal of work. The military authorities were given permission to use Jesse Ketchum and Givens street schools, and their request for Crawford street school will be decided at a meeting of a sub-committee to be held shortly. Several acting principals were appointed, and Trustee Hunter proved himself a real hunter. He is hunting the Germans and their language, and a motion requesting the minister of education to consider the substitution of the Russian language for the German in Toronto high schools will be considered at the next meeting of the board.
