Speaker Before Toronto Canadian Club Makes an Arraignment of Canadian Politicians.

So long as we allow that to go on so long will we as we allow that to go on so long will we be on the greased skid of destruction."
George Tate Blakstock, K. C., made this remark in the course of an address delivered yesterday before the Canadian Club on "Some Tendencies."
"Democracy works better in Great Britain than in any other country on the earth because it is an evolution, and the old grandee system which governed at one

earth because it is an evolution, and the old grandee system which governed at one time has been broadened out and has become democratic, and you have an aristocratic governing body, while at the same time that body is in constant touch with the democracy."
