

LOCAL NEWS

The Opportunity circle of The King's Daughters held a small but successful party at the residence of Mrs. Fred Nichols, in King street, yesterday afternoon and realized a very satisfactory sum. Mrs. Nichols received the guests; Mrs. Kirkpatrick presided at the tea table and all the members assisted.

It is thought that one of the New Brunswick Telephone Company's submarine cables connecting the city has sprung a leak, and J. E. Marshall, superintendent of construction, has charge of the repairs. O. J. Fraser, superintendent of the company, said the public would not be inconvenienced by reason of the break.

Mr. and Mrs. C. B. Allan leave on Monday for Ottawa, where they will attend the meeting of the central council of the Canadian Red Cross Society as representatives of the New Brunswick division. The chief matter of discussion at the council meeting, it is expected, will be the coming membership drive.

At a meeting of the board of governors of the St. John County Hospital, held yesterday morning in the county secretary's office, Dr. S. H. McDonald and Mrs. James H. Fink, the only commissioners present, decided to refuse the admission of any more non-resident cases until a further meeting of the board. This action was deemed necessary on account of lack of accommodation.

According to Harry W. Heans, Parsonage, who arrived on the C. P. O. S. Minnedosa yesterday from England, the prices of food and clothing have been on a steady decline. While in London he said he saw the pagoda at the opening of parliament. He said the streets around Downing street had been partly removed, but outsiders were not admitted to parliament.

Some of A. G. Day's friends were his guests last evening when he gave them a sleigh drive out to John Tongue's place on the Black River road. About twelve couples were in the party and on arrival Tongue's an excellent supper was served, followed by dancing and music. The evening, W. H. White, on behalf of the guests presented a handsome necklace to Mr. Day. The party drove back to the city in the early hours of the morning.

The Rev. A. L. Tedford, who has spent the last year in the northwest evangelistic service, is on his way to St. John to resume his pastorate in the 'abernacle Baptist church. He sent a telegram a few days ago that he expected to be in the city to assume his duties on this coming Sunday. His congregation undoubtedly will be delighted to learn of his return. Rev. I. Brindley, who has been taking the pastor's place, accepted the call to Ludlow street Baptist church about two months ago.

Yesterday afternoon, Rev. T. Hunter Boyd delivered an interesting lecture on the new map of Europe before the St. John teachers. Dr. H. S. Bridges was in the chair. He traced his travels through Central Europe into such countries as Poland, Bohemia, Slovakia, Ruthenia, Finland, Austria and Hungary. He urged the importance of geographical study upon the teachers. A hearty vote of thanks was passed to the speaker.

The Y. M. C. A. had as its guests last night about seventy of the boys from the East End Boys' Club and it gave them a splendid evening of entertainment. First a four-reel programme of motion pictures was put on for the benefit of the boys and then under the direction of Nelson McEwen and H. Morton they spent a lively and happy time in the swimming tank and in the gymnasium. W. K. Haley, president of the playgrounds association, and Miss Heffer, superintendent of the club, were in charge of the boys.

The executive of the St. John Deaneys Sunday School Teachers' Association met at the church of England institute on Tuesday evening and drew up an interesting programme for the year. Stanley Olive, the president, occupied the chair and Miss Nellie Upham was the secretary. Special events included in the programme arranged were a summer meeting to take the form of an outing and a visit from R. A. Hills, general secretary of the board of religious education of the church of England in Canada. Mr. Hills is expected to arrive in St. John next month.

Twelve men, two from St. John, arrived on the C. P. O. S. Minnedosa yesterday without incident and were met by their families and as their homes are in different parts of Canada, they are stranded in St. John. According to the men, they have grievances against the British board of trade and the Canadian investigation office in London, as they believed they would be fed and receive transportation to their homes. All of the men are former members of the Canadian army on the steamer Minnedosa, which reached the city yesterday morning. She is the guest of her uncle, Captain A. J. Mulcahy, West Side, for a few days before proceeding to Toronto, where she will join the staff of St. Michael's college. She tells of trying times in Ireland and of almost daily clashes between Republican authorities of Cork and crown forces.

An attempted robbery was perpetrated at the store of W. E. Corbett at Westfield early Wednesday morning. Mr. Corbett was awakened by the sound of shattering glass, and dressed hastily and made his way across the road to the store. The would-be thieves, six in number, finding that they were detected, rushed to the rear of the store, broke open a door and made their way down the railway track. Mr. Corbett gave chase and was fired on six times, but all went wild. When last seen the six men were crossing the line in the direction of Woodman's Point.

At a meeting of the Hostel Committee, held yesterday in the Women's Hostel, the financial report was presented by Mrs. J. H. Jenner, covering January and February. The receipts were \$810.67, and expenditures \$805.50, leaving a balance on hand of \$226.17. Outstanding bills to the amount of \$89 were ordered paid. RESTIGOUCHE ELECTION VOID

Justice Barry Finds That N. B. Election Law Was Not Complied With — Stewart and Diotte Unseated.

Dalhousie, N. B., Feb. 23.—Upon the question of law and fact I feel bound by authority to declare the election void, which I accordingly do," summarized the decision of Judge Barry of the supreme court, which he delivered today in the proceedings instituted against the confirmation of the election of David A. Stewart and Henry Diotte, elected on the face of the returns, to the legislature in the general elections last October as supporters of the opposition led by Hon. Dr. J. B. M. Baxter. The ground of the voiding of the election in this case was general violations of the New Brunswick election laws.

In the general elections the vote in a three-cornered contest was announced on a declaration day as follows: A. T. LeBlanc, government, 1,646; S. S. Harrison, government, 1,646; David A. Stewart, Conservative, 1,048; Henry Diotte, Conservative, 1,763; Hon. C. H. LaBrosse, Independent, 1,590; Mr. Duncan, Independent, 1,063.

The government has twenty-four supporters in the legislature and before the voiding of the Restigouche election the number of Conservatives, United Farmers and Labor party men was also twenty-four.

The proceedings against the election of Messrs. Stewart and Diotte were instituted by Arthur T. LeBlanc and S. S. Harrison.

Judge Barry's Ruling.

The following are extracts from the decision of Mr. Justice Barry: "As to the irregularity of the nomination of Messrs. LaBrosse and Duncan, while each of their nomination papers purport to have been signed by twenty-three persons, presumably electors, there is no verification of either of the names on the nomination paper nor to the consent of the nominees to such nomination. There has been no attempt made to carry out the provisions of section sixty-nine of the New Brunswick election act in regard to the identification and proof of the signatures of the alleged nominators and if I am correct in the view that the nomination of these two gentlemen is void, the nomination of candidates is imperative and not directory, merely, then it would seem to me to be clear that the returning officer in the exercise of the ministerial and quasi-judicial duties with which the law has clothed him should have rejected the nominative papers of Messrs. LaBrosse and Duncan and refused to accept them as legally nominated candidates.

"The returning officer did not enter upon his duties in connection with the holding of the election take the oath of office as prescribed by the New Brunswick election act, so that from the very inception of his duties the returning officer proceeded illegally; that is without having been duly sworn to the performance of those duties. There is nothing to show that any election clerk was appointed, and if my conception of the election act be a correct one, in my opinion, not a ballot deposited at either of those unauthorized polling sub-divisions was a legal vote and one that should have been counted. But the election now under review seems to me to have been carried on with an utter disregard of all and every prescription which the legislature has laid down for its conduct.

"This election was so irregularly conducted as to prevent it from being a true election. The effect of the proved transgressions of the law by the officials is such that the election cannot be said to have been conducted under the existing election laws. It is open to reasonable doubt whether these transgressions may not have affected the result. The election has been conducted in a manner contrary to the principles of an election by ballot.

"Such being my opinion and finding upon the question of law and fact I feel bound by authority to declare the election void, which I accordingly do. It is void, I think, both at common law and under the existing statutes. As to the first return made by the returning officer, if that be still in effect, and subsequent declaration, I declare that also to be void and order that it be set aside and voided."

SAUVE'S CHARGES RE LIQUOR ACT

Quebec, Feb. 24.—(Canadian Press)—A notice of motion filed by Arthur Sauve, leader of the Quebec opposition, regarding members and the liquor traffic, did not concern any names. This afternoon he will declare that he has the names of the members and is prepared to prove his accusations before a royal commission, and if the premier gives the assurance of this he will then give the names of the members he accuses.

Mrs. Sauve said in his motion that he has credible information and believes he can prove that the dispositions of the Quebec prohibition laws have been violated generally with the knowledge of its officers, and that deputies and legislators have realized profits from the issue and exploitation of liquor licenses.
