Saw Girl on Park Bench and Killed Her, Then Committed Suicide.

Philadelphia, Pa, Aug. 12.—Mistaking a young woman sitting on a bench in Elmwood Park, Norristown, for his wife. James Bosely shot her and inflict ted a wound which may prove fatal. He then committed suicide.

The victim, Mrs. Mary Quoiser, who is inneteen years old, is in a critical condition with a bullet wound in the head Bosely, who is twenty-three years old, and lives in Conshowcken, separated from his wife three weeks ago. A note found in the dead man's pocket asked that he and his wife be buried together.

Mrs. Quoiser, whose husband is in Texas, was sitting on a bench along the main driveway in Elmwood Park with Jerald Vincent Marshall, eighteen years old, of Norristown. On an adjoining bench were Mr. and Mrs. Hurst, relatives of Marshall.

They had not been there long when Bosely, whom they did not know, walked up the boulevard. He stopped in front of the bench on which the Hursts were seated, looked at the occupants and retreated.

Going to the other bench, only a few feet away, he gave one glance, and, drawing a revolver from his pocket, fired one shot at the woman. He then put the revolver to his head and fired once more. He fell where he stood.

Marshall ran in terror, while thursts were too dumfounded to act. A few minutes afterward two men in an automobile took Bosely and Mrs. Quoiser to the hospital.

SEES LONGER SKIRT, **BUT NOT TOO LONG**

Designer for Mrs. Harding Says Proper Length Will be 81/2 Inches From the Ground.

The American woman is governed by the principles of good taxes and not by the laws of fashion, according to Harry Collins, costumer to Mrs. Harding, who spoke yesterday afternoon before the students studying clothing, textiles and designs at Teachers' College, Columbia University, on the prevailing fashions of today.

Mr. Collins pointed out the need of conservatism in dress is one wished to be well groomed, and took issue with the prevailing impression that women must change their style of dress with the seasons if they wished to be fashionable. He said that if a woman exercised care in her purchases she could wear a gown two or perhaps three seasons, and in order to impress this point he produced a model who wore a gown designed three seasons ago, with only a few touches in trimming and sleeve-cut making it the last word in style. He also laid stress upon the need for good materials.

Interest seemed to centre in the length of the skirt, which is to be eight and one-half inches from the ground, if women are to follow the dictates of Mr. Collins. He explained that this applied to street costumes alone, for evening gowns will be considerably longer, some of them reaching to within three inches of the floor.

"There seems to be a positive inclination to lengthen the skirts here, although the skirt length will not drop as it has in Paris," said Mr. Collins. "This year we will find them eight or nine inches from the floor and perhaps a little longer next year.

"Except in the case of a few exaggerated models that have reached the public either from abroad or from the more extreme designers here, the silhouette has remained the same for many seasons. The variation has been in the trimmings, such as the panels and soft effects that can be added to the taste of popular demand. The silhouette found night after night at the Metropolitan Opera House, where the best-dressed women of the country assemble, has not changed in the last ten years.

"Nor are we to have a much corseted figue again. Such echoes have reached us from Paris, but when these rumors were followed to their source it has been found that the designer of Paris decreed that the well-dressed woman should wear a girdle or something in the nature of a corset to hold the garment in place."


