

LEASES FOR THREE YEARS

Commissioner Thornton Wants This for Market Building Stores

Eight Firms Affected; Rents a Bit Higher—Commissioners Favor New Fire Apparatus—Paving Plans Advance.

A resolution authorizing him to lease the stores in the market building for three years instead of one year as at present was moved by Commissioner Thornton in committee this morning.

Under the new system an increased rental will be charged. The people affected by the new order and the amounts paid last year and under the new arrangement are as follows:

Mr. Thornton said that the tenants were agreeable to the new rate and the resolution was carried.

New Fire Apparatus.

Mr. Thornton also asked to be given authority for the purchase of a new 75-foot aerial ladder truck and a motor combination pump, chemical and hose wagon. He said that he had recently visited many of the fire stations in upper Canada and the eastern states and found that the horse drawn fire apparatus had been almost entirely discarded on account of the increased cost of fuel and the convenience of the motor vehicles.

The new equipment, he said, would cost about \$30,000. It was finally decided that the commissioner be asked to bring in recommendations as to the make of truck and motor combination wagon required, with the price, the commissioners in the meantime expressing themselves as being in favor of the expenditure.

Mr. Fisher brought in the matter of a motor flusher for the streets, but the mayor ruled that this should be taken up as a separate item.

On motion of Commissioner Bullock lot No. 12 in Prospect street, 35 by 80 feet, rented to Winstor Webb at an annual rental of \$1,500, was recommended for sale to Mr. Webb for \$150,000. Another lot in Main street, Fairville, 25 feet in front, 100 feet deep and 35 feet wide for \$850. The annual rental was \$25.22.

Paving Matters.

Commissioner Fisher gave notice that he would move at tomorrow's council meeting that tenders be called for the paving of Prince William street and also one side of the Market road from Cooper's corner to the city line. He said that in Prince William street the asphalt work could be done by the public works department, while the truck sections could be done by contract in granite, brick or concrete. The Market road was recommended with mixed asphalt on the proposed foundation of broken stone. He said that the department was ready to call soon for tenders for Douglas avenue and City road and the plans for Haymarket square and Brussels street, re well advanced and would be ready soon.

AMBULANCE IS OFFERED CITY

Mrs. Thomas Bell and Mrs. H. W. Frink, representing the executive of the Red Cross Society at Rothesay, today offered the city the ambulance which was given to the Canadian expeditionary force during the latter part of the war, and which was not used on account of the signing of the armistice. The conditions are that with the two ambulances in service urgent calls for transportation of cases from outlying districts to the hospital would be undertaken.

The two ladies made the proposition to the mayor and commissioners at the committee meeting this morning. The ambulance is a Cadillac and cost about \$3,000.

Commissioner Thornton said that the ambulance would be a valuable asset to the city but would necessitate another man for calls outside the city, and there was no place in the city property at present to store it. A suggestion was made that the county council might take up the matter at the meeting of the finance committee on Thursday, and it was decided to leave the matter to Commissioner Thornton to report at the next meeting of the council.

MOTOR HEARSE HIT BY TRAIN

N. W. Brennan and C. N. Smith Injured While Conveying Body to Smithtown.

F. B. Brennan of N. W. Brennan and Sons, funeral directors, and C. N. Smith of Montreal had a narrow escape from serious injury on Saturday afternoon when a construction train of an engine and one car struck their motor hearse at the gravel pit crossing near Lakeside. Mr. Brennan was attending the funeral of Alfred Smith, whose body was brought here from Montreal Saturday noon and was being conveyed to Smithtown for interment. As they were approaching the crossing on the Hampton and St. Martins branch of the C. N. R. Mr. Brennan noticed the oncoming train. He stopped the machine and endeavored to reverse but being on a slight grade the car started to the crossing before it could be stopped and as he attempted to back off the train struck the machine pitching it into the ditch. Mr. Brennan was also being hurled about the neck while Mr. Smith was hurt about the legs, arms and back. The train came to a stop and the crew soon extricated Mr. Smith from the wreckage near the mouth of the Nashwaak between the C. N. R. tracks and the Nashwaak. The price is said to be about \$10,000. It is being acquired as a site for a pulp and paper mill.
