G. W. V. A. Resolution.

At a meeting of the executive of the G. W. V. A. held on Thursday evening at the first vice-president, S. C. Tippett, in the chair, a resolution was passed to the effect that the secretary would apply for membership in the Amateur Athletic Union. Other business which will be brought before the next meeting was also transacted.
The resolution was as follows: Resolved, that the secretary be authorized to apply for membership in the Amateur Athletic Union; that this executive commend the guarantee of credit to the amount of \$500 for the association baseball team, this sum to be refunded on the gate receipts of the City of St. John, and that any surplus funds coming from this source be placed in a trust fund to be spent for the benefit of the baseball team. The trustees of this fund to be the president of the association, Walter Donahue, selected by the sporting committee.

RUTH HAS FIVE TO HIS CREDIT

Three Homers Lined Out by Him This Week
Johnson of Cleveland to Front of American League Batters and Nicholson of Pittsburgh Takes Lead Among Nationals.

Chicago, May 15.—"Babe" Ruth's 1920 offensive towards a new home run record is in full bloom. The New York slugger connected with a trio of home runs in two days and has five circuit drives to his credit, according to averages completed today. The averages include games of Wednesday.

Johnson of Cleveland shot to the front

among the American League batters

with an average of .414, acquired in twenty games. The Cleveland first baseman connected with twenty-nine hits for a total of thirty-one bases, and for a total of forty-five bases, being at bat seventy-eight times in his rival's seventy.

Bob Roth of Washington is showing the way to the base stealers with nine thefts. Ty Cobb has not yet fully recovered his batting eye. In twenty-one games with Detroit the star has made only eighteen hits for an average of .243.

Other leading batters are: Kinney, Philadelphia, .381; Weaver, Chicago, .366; Felsch, Chicago, .362; Speaker, Cleveland, .342; Hendrix, Boston, .341; Gerber, St. Louis, .338; Geddon, St. Louis, .337; Sisler, St. Louis, .332.

Outfielder Nicholson of Pittsburgh has taken the lead among the National League batters. He is hitting .435 for twelve games, with Hornsby, the St. Louis star, the runner-up with .414, one point in front of Lehoucq of Philadelphia. The averages include players who have participated in ten or more games.

Max Flack, the Chicago lead off man, is the leading run getter. He has registered seventeen times, and has been on base an average of twice a game, but the members following him have not been able to deliver the necessary punch to put him across the plate with anything like consistency.

Williams of Philadelphia and Robertson of Chicago are tied for home run

honors. Each has whacked out three round trips. Rousch of Cincinnati, who has recovered his batting eye, and is up among the leaders this week, is a triple tie for stolen base honors with his teammate Neale and Stock of St. Louis. Each has pilfered five bases.

Other leading batters are: Groh, Cincinnati, .371; Burns, New York, .355; Z. Wheat, Brooklyn, .344; Daubert, Cincinnati, .333; Fick, Chicago, .321; Rousch, Cincinnati, .321; Myers, Brooklyn, .319.

GOOD SEATS UP TO THE LAST MINUTE

ADD 15 PER CENT. TO THE WAGES

Announcement by American Woollen Company Affecting Thousands.

Boston, May 15.—A wage increase of 15 per cent was announced yesterday by the American Woollen Company. The advance will be effective at all the mills of the company on May 31. The increase makes a total advance of 111 per cent compounded since January, 1916. The company operates fifty-nine mills and employs 45,000 hands.

New Bedford, Mass., May 15.—The textile council yesterday referred to the individual unions the matter of acceptance of a 15 per cent wage advance offered the mill operatives here by the manufacturers. The unions were instructed to report their action not later than Sunday night. The mill spinners' union voted last night to accept the offer. A mass meeting of all operatives has been called for Sunday night.
