OTTAWA LETTER

A Difference of Opinion Over Election Lists

The Big Commissions, Industrial, Cost of Living and Pensions—Comment on Their Work

(Special Correspondence of The Times.)
Ottawa, June 28.—It was expected all along that parliament would prorogue about the first of July, but that expectation has now been disappointed, as there is enough legislation in sight or on the way through the mill to keep parliament sitting until well on towards the middle of the month. The house is now wading its way through the soldiers' settlement bill and has the highways and civil service and other legislation to deal with, even if it never touches the franchise bill, as now seems likely will be the case.

With regard to the latter, a pronouncement is promised any day as the government has been trying to effect an arrangement with the opposition under which the by-elections can be held. There is some difference of opinion on this in the cabinet. The Conservatives in the house object to using the provincial lists, which have been supplied chiefly by Liberal administrations, and want to adopt the enumerator system. Maclean and Carvell both object to this very strongly, maintaining that the lists are there and are the proper machinery to use. It is possible that the simplest way out of it would be to grant full manhood and womanhood suffrage for the by-elections only.

There are three important committees or commissions now at work, or which have been at work, and from which reports have not yet been received, but whose recommendations it would seem necessary to receive before the house adjourns. These are the industrial commission, the common pension committee and the common cost of living committee.

The industrial commission under Judge Mathers is expected to hand in its report this week. In the last two months it has held seventy-two sittings all over Canada and examined 500 witnesses. The composition of this commission was interesting. Judge Mathers, the chairman, may be described as a man with firm convictions, based on a long connection with the judiciary and with a good grasp of industrial problems. Swenson White is conservative; Paine, a mild conservative and moderate protectionist; Riordan, a millionaire social economist; Harrison, an old-line trades-unionist; Moore, a militant trades-unionist; and Bruce, a declared socialist. It has held holding meetings throughout the dominion with a view to the democratization of industry so as to give labor an interest in the management of business. This principle has been recognized by the Whiteley commission in England, and a great deal of present day sentiment is based on that report, which is constantly quoted. (The principle of collective bargaining, which is the most or less involved, has been recognized already to some extent by the railway war board; but the government has not yet accepted the application must await the finding of the industrial commission. The trouble in Winnipeg has not helped along the idea any, but it will no doubt be taken up when the Mathers report is considered.)

It is expected that the pension committee will revise the present schedule giving an advance of about twenty per cent in pensions and making other recommendations regarding changes in the present schedule, which experience has taught as advisable.

Cost of Living.
Perhaps the most important body of all now sitting is the cost of living commission. It has been working morning, noon and night for weeks and has had witnesses before it from all over Canada representing every vital industry. A great deal of valuable evidence has been elicited, and there has unquestionably been evidence disclosed of enormous profits made in more than one industry affecting the food and clothing of the people. In the textile and milling industries extremely large profits have been disclosed, and nearly every industry seems to have been doing pretty well during the war. The millers have been restricted in their profits per barrel to a figure fixed by the food board; so that the chief criticism made of them has been the enormous volume of profits made by some mills as a result of a large turnover, and, in the earlier years of the war, from increase of price on stocks of grain held.

There has also been a charge—or at least an idea in the mind of some members of the committee—that the mills have tried to take advantage of the situation and elude the fixed profit allowed them by charges of twenty cents a barrel for delivery and credit terms. Generally speaking, the mills appear to be a well organized and carefully conducted business, although in one case a large amount of unexplainable waste was revealed.

In several lines evidence of recklessness, if not design, in the profits taken has been elicited. This, together with other considerations, make it necessary that some such body as an inland trade commission be set up.
