**HARD BLOW FOR GIANTS**  
 Loss of Doyle Serious Hardship On Western Trip  
 New York, May 21.—That Larry Doyle will be lost to the Giants for a much longer time than the club officials care to admit is evident from the fact that Manager McGraw has sought, Bert Nelson, regular place at second base, to play in Doyle's place at second base. It is stated that while the Giants were playing the Phillies here, just before going west, Manager McGraw realized the seriousness of Doyle's intestinal trouble and immediately started to negotiate with St. Louis for Nelson's services. While it is reported that there is much improvement in Doyle's condition since his operation at the New York Post-Graduate Hospital here, the club officials are not counting on Doyle's return to playing form for some time to come. It is feared that it will be many weeks before Doyle will be able to take his regular place at second for the Giants.  
 The loss of Doyle at a time when he is leading the league with a batting average of .406, and fielding just as well as when he was at his best, is the real cause of the club's trouble when they invaded the west without Laughlin Lary. The sudden loss of such an important factor in the batting order and team play of the club naturally upset it after its wild ride of triumph through the eastern clubs. The Giants' attack became disarranged and it probably will not get back to its highest point of efficiency again until the new man Nelson is thoroughly fitted into the club system of play.  
 In the five games played by the Giants last week they won two and lost three. The falling off in hitting, which was so evident against the Pittsburgh left-handed pitchers, was even more pronounced against Matty's Cincinnati Reds.

## FAILURE OF TITLE BOUT NO SURPRISE

Abandonment of Heavyweight Match Had Been Expected  
 Public Was Opposed—Adverse Sentiment Steadily Increased and Many States Refused to Allow Contest  
 New York, May 21.—The abandonment of the proposed heavyweight championship boxing bout between Jess Willard, title-holder, and Fred Fulton, challenger, of Minnesota, which was scheduled to be held somewhere in the United States July 4, has been taken more or less agreeably by the followers of boxing. The announcement which came from Colonel J. C. Miller of Bliss, Okla., potential promoter of the biggest event in pugilism, had been expected for weeks past, and strange as it might seem for an event of such importance, the eventual turn of events has not occasioned remorse.  
 Willard's retirement, following so closely the abandonment of the title bout, likewise will be taken calmly by followers of the sport, who have long held the opinion that Willard would not again be seen in a public ring encounter where his laurels were at stake.  
 Since the news was first sent broadcast that the men had signed articles for the bout under the direction of Colonel Miller, public sentiment experienced a great change. Taken at first with a display of enthusiasm and expectation, principally through the announced intention of the principals to make it a fitting war-time championship bout, feeling against the contest took a turn. Disapproval made itself manifest, and instead of a championship bout over a distance, the contest was reduced to a ten-round affair, in which it was the universal opinion Willard's title would be safe. When it began to be evident from public opinion of all the states in the Union, where governors prohibited the bout, and refused to propose to give the match an air of patriotism.  
 All the time, though, public feeling against the contest had advanced, and the patronage, which was at first expected, was shown to be a doubtful quantity. And then came a series of rebuffs from various states in the Union, where governors prohibited the bout, and refused to propose to give the match an air of patriotism.  
 The first rebuff to Colonel Miller and the boxers came from the civic officials of St. Paul and Minneapolis. Colonel Miller's announcement some time ago that the bout would be held at a point midway between these two cities seemed to show that at last a battleground where there would be no opposition had been found. The enthusiasm was short-lived, however, for the match attracted a storm of protest in these two cities, as it had previously at other places, where it was rumored it might be held, until the plans were abandoned.  
 Governor M. H. Holcomb of Connecticut closed the gates of that state to the match just when negotiations to have it staged there were to be renewed. And subsequently the bout was banned by the Governor of Utah. This left only New Orleans and Baltimore as possible battlegrounds, as the feeling in the western part of the country was of such a nature as to make indelible any thought of taking it west. It was even considered doubtful that the respective executives of Louisiana and Maryland would permit the bout on soil in their jurisdiction, which left only one course for Colonel Miller to follow, and he did.

Local Giants Win.  
 The Giants defeated the North End Stars in a fast game last night by a large margin. The features of the game were the good fielding and timely hitting of Arbo, the base-running and catching of Geo. Arnold and the steady pitching of Cyril Moore was also remarkable, as he had the sluggers swinging wildly at the air. The batteries were, for the winners, Arnold and Moore; for the losers, McCormick and Williams.

New York, April 21.—Ralph De Palma, a leader among auto racers, will start in the Harkness Handicap of 100 miles, which will feature the track meet at the Sheepshead Bay Speedway on Decoration Day. The sprint champion of 1917 finally came to terms last night with Promoter William H. Wellman.  
 The Italian pilot all last week indulged in secret trials at the Sheepshead track. Gradually he worked his machine up to the point which led him to believe he could meet Mario Tosta, his rival in many races.  
 A record-breaking competition in the Harkness race is expected, for the double reason of the notable field entered and because the 100-mile battle will be run under a handicap system for the first time. Even though Tosta is his natural rival, De Palma declared that under the new conditions he wouldn't be able for a second to overlook the fact that Louis Chevrolet, speedway champion last year; Barney Oldfield, Ralph Mulford, Vanderbilt Cup winner, and Ira Vail, the twenty-two year old Brooklyn youth, who is a prime favorite with auto fans, have fine chances of going to the front.  
 De Palma last year set a new world's mark by driving 138.12 miles in six hours. De Palma drove alone the entire distance. The previous record of 506 miles was made by three pilots, who drove in relays. This is only one of the Italian's many remarkable achievements.  
 He won the sprint title last season from Oldfield, beating the veteran in three straight heats. During his ten-year racing career he has won more than \$150,000 in prizes. The veteran also holds a double victory in Vanderbilt cup events and Elgin road competitions. He finished first in 1915, for the \$20,000 Indianapolis Sweepstakes. De Palma has the distinction of being the only one who ever defeated Dario Resta in a race in which the latter won the full distance. This was the 1915 Indianapolis contest.  
 De Palma, Oldfield, Chevrolet, Mulford, and Vail are well known, and their number will be increased by the presence of several western stars, who are strong
