BORDEN MOVES ADJOURNMENT

Deadlock at Ottawa Ended Temporarily

TORIES IN ROWDY ACT

Torpedoes Thrown Among Liberals as Pardee and Emmerson Are Speaking—Closing Scenes of Remarkable Week

Ottawa, March 9.—The house adjourned on Saturday night and will resume at three o'clock today. It was the longest session in the history of the commonsense, being from Monday until Saturday, all of which time was still considered as Monday.

"With my hon. friend's permission, I move that the committee rise, report progress and ask leave to sit again."

Within thirty seconds of midnight Saturday after 120 hours of continuous sitting of parliament, Premier Borden, amid Liberal cheers, this temporarily terminated one of the most dramatic deadlocks in the parliamentary history of Canada.

F. B. Carvell, who had the floor at the time, promptly accused and the motion carried. Speaker Sproule bravely announced that Deputy Speaker Blundin for the committee had reported that the committee had made "some progress" and that the committee would have leave to sit again on Monday next.

"I move that the house do now adjourn," said Premier Borden.

"I presume we will continue this discussion on Monday," observed Sir Wilfrid, with a smile, while the Liberals cheered again.

"As soon as the government orders are reached we shall proceed with this bill," replied the premier.

"I declare this house adjourned till Monday at 3 o'clock," declared Speaker Sproule. Then he followed the maze out of the chamber.

Such was the end of the "Monday's sitting" of the house of commons. Since the end of Hon. Robert Rogers' threat at 1 o'clock on Tuesday morning that the committee would not rise until 3 o'clock of the Borden naval bill had been passed and Sir Wilfrid Laurier's quiet but firm rejoinder: "Very well, make progress."

Three resounding cheers from the Liberal members with waving handkerchiefs repeated a moment later by three more cheers and a tiger, marked their appreciation of the manner in which progress had been made.

CO-OPERATION FOR THE FARMERS

Valuable Address by Head of University of Maine

INDIVIDUALISM DIES OUT

Shows Results of Working Together in European Countries—Some Advice to the Potato Growers of the Neighboring State

(Bangor Commercial)

President R. J. Aley, speaking before the members of the Madocawandoo club of this city, Thursday evening, declared that efficiency in any line of business or endeavor depends largely at the present day upon co-operation and without co-operation the highest type of efficiency cannot be attained.

"We have to go back to the soil for everything, and to get it from the soil we must have transportation," said the speaker.

"Farming, as no other line of business has had a tendency to develop individualism, and in no business is there such a tendency to exaggerate individual characteristics as in farming."

"Just now those who are engaged in agriculture are beginning to realize that the highest efficiency of the farmer himself cannot be realized until some of the individualism is broken down and the farmer learns to co-operate with his fellow men."

"Because of this individualism the farmer finds it harder to finance his business. Statistics show that the manufacturer can finance his business at 3, 4, 4 1/2 and 5 per cent, and get all the money that he needs to make his business develop in the installation of better machinery, new methods or anything that will tend to better efficiency in his factory. On the other hand the farmer has to pay from 6 to 9 and 10 per cent for money, and the result is that the individualism or independence of the farmer, which has made him so laudable."

"The farmer looks upon debt as something to be avoided. The modern business man looks upon an asset, as an asset, as a very valuable one, if it is a proper debt."

"When we began the agricultural development of the middle west there was thrown into the markets of the world immense quantities of wheat, corn and oats. The farmers of Europe, who were farming on land worth several times as much per acre as the lands of this country found that they were unable to meet this competition. Disaster stared them in the face unless something was done. They had to become more efficient."

"The possibility of increasing the yield of their fields appealed to them, but to do this they had to have more machinery, more fertilizer and better methods. It forced them to co-operate."

"As the result of this co-operation there have sprung up in nearly all the agricultural regions of continental Europe banks that do nothing but cater to rural needs. Great loan associations have capitalized farming lands and made assets out of them. Farmers can borrow money at a low rate of interest there for a long period."

"Through the organization of these banks, which are largely mutual, the farmers have learned that they co-operate in many other ways, the advantage of each other, and this is especially true in buying their supplies and marketing the products of their fields."

"As the result of this co-operation every acre under cultivation there is yielding two or three times as much as the amount which we consider our best yield. It has also tended to make all the people intensely interested in the success of each other. There has been a great increase in general efficiency, but there has been a special increase in the efficiency of the individual."

Potato Advice

Dr. Aley told of the movement in this country for the establishment of the system of rural banking and rural credit which has been investigated by experts from the United States.

"The greatest efficiency in any line of work must come through co-operation and the old idea that a man can force himself in and carry on his own business is

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TABLET IN MEMORY OF HON. WM. PAGAN

St. Andrew's Society Members at Impressive Service in Celebration of Anniversary

With the unveiling of a tablet to the memory of their first president, Hon. William Pagan, the members of St. Andrew's Society marked their 110th anniversary in St. Andrew's Presbyterian church last evening.

The society turned out in force. The members met at the Christadelphian hall, in Union street, and marched from there to the church where the service was conducted by Rev. Gordon Dickie, the chaplain of the society.

The tablet was unveiled by James Jack, president of the St. Andrew's Society, the chaplain presenting it to the kirk session on behalf of the society.

In a brief but impressive address, Rev. Mr. Dickie referred to Hon. William Pagan, and his work in connection with the establishment of St. Andrew's Society and in St. Andrew's church. Hon. Mr. Pagan, Mr. Dickie said, had long ago gone to his rest, but the influence of his character still remained. He had been a man prominent in many ways, and had done much good work for the community. St. Andrew's Society was assembled there to honor his memory.

The tablet, which is a replica of the one destroyed by fire in 1877, is a very handsome one of white marble. It is the work of the Glasgow, Scotland, and was one of the Loyalists who landed here in 1783. He took a very prominent place in the history of this city and was one of the founders and incorporators of St. Andrew's church. He was a member of H. M. Council and representative in the house of assembly from St. John county till his death in 1819.

St. Andrew's Society was founded in this city at a meeting of citizens of Scotch birth or descent on March 8, 1788.

CHEAP TELEPHONES FOR NOVA SCOTIA FARMERS

(Halifax Chronicle)

Hon. O. T. Daniels, introduced a government bill in the House of Assembly yesterday relating to rural telephones. This was one of the measures forecasted in the speech at the opening of the legislature.

The government has invoked the principle of co-operation and applied it to the rural telephone problem. It is well known that a rural district can get out the poles and erect them at a minimum of expense.

The bill provides that any three residents on a rural district, by signing a memorandum, can become incorporated to carry on the business of a telephone company. Application is made to the board of public utility commissioners, who fix the boundaries of the district to be served. A plan of the district is prepared and the rural line may be connected with the line of any existing company at the nearest convenient point.

The farmers furnish the poles and erect them, and the government is authorized to give a subsidy of twenty dollars per mile to the rural company. This sum, it is estimated will pay for the wire and the cost of stringing it. Then each subscriber buys his own telephone and the line is ready for business.

A charge of five cents is fixed to be paid to any existing company with whom system as well as the facility to speak with a subscriber in the nearest market town for five cents a message. The surplus of the four or five dollars remaining after repairs to the line are made in any year will go into a sinking fund which will replace the line when it became necessary to do so. The bill allows every evidence of careful drafting and provides a means of giving every rural community cheap telephone service.
