DISGRACEFUL SCENE AT HOCKEY MATCH

North Bay, March 9.—Two men were badly injured and one arrested resulted from a bitterly contested hockey game, last night, between North Bay and Sturgeon Falls teams, for the Mackie cup. With the score five to four in favor of Sturgeon Falls in the second half, two of the players clinched and a free fight on the ice began.
