Philadelphia, Feb. 18 .- The Philadelhia Engineering Company will, in a few days, ship overland to San Francisco and thence to Japan an immense steel plate smokestack to equip a large new electric light plant in Yokohama. ### GREAT FALL OF SNOW

Seattle, Feb. 17 .- Two hundred men are now said to be at work on the Great Northern tunnel in the Cascade mountains and according to advices as to the great quantity of snow that has fallen in the past two or three days they cannot be envied.
