MAKE THE LIST LEGAL

The objection of the corrupt section of either political party against action which proposes to make the voters' list conform to the "one man, one vote" law is easy to understand. By as many names as the list exceeds the legal standard, opportunities for the casting of fraudulent ballots are given. If the St. John list contains the names of 220 men who, by reason of non-residence, have no qualification to vote either in St. John city or county and the great majority of whom have no intention of coming here to vote, just that many chances for impersonation and perjury are provided. It is difficult to see why any supporter of pure politics would oppose the reduction of those chances. Besides its illegal non-resident additions the St. John voters' list is otherwise very imperfect. According to the

wise very imperfect. According to the law, an elector residing in the county and owning real estate in the city, or one residing in the city and owning one residing in the city and owning property in the county, may vote in both places. But there are now on the city resident list the names of over a hundred men who reside in St. John county or adjoining counties, who, though they do business or practice their profession in the city, own no property therein, and pay into the city treasury only a tax on their income. These men are also registered in the various parishes in which they reside, and may vote twice in spite of the law

That a man who lives outside the city and escapes taxation thereby should be freed from the law which limits to one vote a man who dwells within the city and pays his full share which the revisors must remedy be ore their work can be considered com-plete. Such a move on their part can
