Several Aldermen are in the List, and Members of the Board of Trade - An Advertising Campaign a Feature.

CHARGE OF KEEPING SMUGGLED LIQUORS

Information Made Against James McCarthy.

James McCarthy, the Dock street wholesale and retail liquor dealer, was before the police court this morning on a charge preferred by Harry B. Burnham of the customs service.

Mr. McCarthy was represented by H. A. McKeown, and E. H. McAlpine was present in the interests of the government to prosecute. There are two informations and complaints of Custom Officer Burnham, of Annapolis, laid against Mr. McCarthy and charges that on the seventh day of February and 21st of March James McCarthy unlawfully and knowingly and in contravention of section 197 of the custom act did harbour, keep, conceal, purchase, sell, and exchange certain dutiable goods to wit, alcohol and alcoholic liquors unlawfully imported into Canada, and whereon the duties lawfully payable had not been paid and did thereby incur the penalty not exceeding \$200 and not less than \$50, or imprisonment for a term not exceeding one year and not less than one month, or both fine and imprisonment by the said section.

Mr. McCarthy pleaded not guilty to the offence and informed the Star that he knew nothing about the case whatever.

The Star has been informed that a great deal of smuggling is going on along the coast of Nova Scotia. That schooners continually arrive from the United States ports with shipments of alcohol and other liquors which when purchased in the United States at two dollars a gallon are worth double the price in Canada. The duty is high and a smuggler landing the liquor on the Nova Scotia shore or any part of Canada can make a good deal if not covered by the custom officials. The officials have been having a hard time to catch the smugglers. It is said that merchants have been offered the underground goods at anywhere from a barrel to 100 barrels all landed in Nova Scotia when the customs officials are not looking.

ALEX. R. GLOBE IS REPORTED MISSING

Former St. John Man, Recently a Resident of Sydney, Has Not Been Heard From for Months.

A despatch received yesterday from Sydney states that A. R. Globe, a photographer, is reported missing since September 1 and fears are entertained as to his whereabouts. He was at Marble Mountain during the month of August and Sept. 1. He wrote to Sydney saying that he would be there on the following Saturday. He never arrived. He ordered his mail re-addressed to Sydney, and it has never been called for. It is now being sent to the dead letter office.

SCHOONER FAUNA IS WATERLOGGED AT LUBEC

Will be Brought to St. John for Repairs - Word Came This Morning.

Captain Ann of Louisburg, N. S., who is staying at the Grand Union Hotel, has received word that the Fauna, a schooner owned by him, has put into Lubec in a water-logged condition.

The Star prints today another lot of opinions from citizens on the proposed organization of a 75,000 club for St. John. Of all who have so far been spoken to, not one man has had a word to say in opposition to the scheme, but all are strongly in favor of it and express their willingness to do everything in their power to assist in the movement. It has been suggested that in the campaign of advertising which may be carried on, the assistance and co-operation of the surveyor general might be enlisted, and also the services of C. A. Duff-Miller, the New Brunswick representative in London. It is regarded as an opportunity that the Grand Falls Company announce their intention of selling power in St. John within the next year or so. Many suggestions have been made by citizens, and there appears to be a lively interest shown in the proposal. The details of the scheme must, of course, be carefully worked out when a committee is chosen, and, of course, this cannot be done in haste.

Among those who have expressed their views to the Star is Joseph Allison, who believes that any such scheme as the one now proposed would be an excellent thing for St. John. He expresses entire approval of the project, and hopes it will be taken up.

Dr. Daniel M. P. is very much in favor of the forming of such a club. The eastern provinces are lacking in their endeavors to bring immigrants here and most of the new arrivals are going to the West. Such an organization as proposed ought to meet with great success.

R. W. W. FRINK. R. W. W. Frink thinks it a capital idea and one which should be encouraged by all citizens. It ought to be very successful.

Geo. McAvity says the proposed club is a very good idea and if it is taken hold of by the right men it can be made very successful.

THOMAS KICKHAM. Thos. Kickham sees no reason why such a club would not be successful and thinks the citizens should take the matter up and do something at once.

T. S. SIMMS. T. S. Simms said if a club was to be started it would be better to have 100,000 of a population for its object than 65,000 or 75,000. The organization ought to be a success if the right people took hold of it.

WILLIAM SHAW. William Shaw thinks it would be a good idea for the citizens to get together and at least talk over some scheme to bring immigration here.

CHAS. A. CLARK. Chas. A. Clark said such an organization might be very successful if all the members would take an interest in it and work hard for it.

C. H. GIBBON. C. H. Gibbon thinks that such an organization should be very successful and would be productive of much good to the city.

JOSEPH A. LIKELY. Joseph A. Likely said that he thought it was the duty of every citizen of St. John to advertise their city and to do all in their power to endeavor to increase St. John's population. Mr. Likely is heartily in favor of such a (Continued on Page Four)
