A NEW BOOK ABOUT SIR GUY CARLETON.

Mr. A. G. Bradley's "Lord Dorchester" is the fourteenth of the volumes so far published of Morang & Company's "Makers of Canada," and the only one that is not the work of a Canadian. But if Canada is not the land of either Mr. Bradley's birth or adoption, the period of its history to which the career of Lord Dorchester belongs is one that few Canadian writers have so fully explored. For many years Mr. Bradley made his home on this side of the Atlantic in order to familiarize himself with local conditions and study original documents bearing on the subject. His transition from French to British rule. In the course of these investigations he made the acquaintance of Francis Parkman, who at that time engaged on his "Montcalm and Wolfe." Mr. Bradley's own work on "Wolfe," prepared for the English "Men of Action" series, appeared twelve years ago. In that life was first given to the world the benefit of the great collection of letters at Sillery, in which the character of the young hero of Quebec is self-revealed. Five or six years later Mr. Bradley's "Flight With France For North America," a historical work took him further within the field into which the writing of "Wolfe" had led him. And now his "Lord Dorchester," which extends the historical work throughout the whole period of the eighteenth century covered by British rule.

THE UNATTACHED HABITANTS.

A portion of this period falls within the scope of another volume in the "Makers of Canada" series, namely, Miss Jean McMillan's "Haldimand." The two writers, however, have a different view of the situation in Canada at that time, both finding in the sources from which they draw their facts convincing evidence of the possibility of organizing the habitants into an efficient defensive force; that the mass of the "new subjects" were not warm on British's side in her struggle with the colonies; that their sympathies for the latter were shown by frequent acts of treachery, and in some cases by overt hostility, in their behalf, cannot be denied. When the peasantry had had a little experience of their "deliverers," there was a swing of the pendulum to the other side of the line of neutrality. Kingsford is more lenient in his historical judgment of the habitants' wavering than are the majority of recent writers on the subject. Possibly, too, it is not too much to say, however, that Sir Guy Carleton's position was more difficult than that of a representative of the British in any of the revolting colonies. There was really no element in the population he could depend on in that crisis, except the clergy and the nobles. The influence of both these ruling classes seemed to have been thrown off by the habitants, who readily listened to the agents of sedition from the colonies.

APPROVES CARLETON'S POLICY.

Mr. Bradley is clearly at variance with those historians who blame Carleton. Of these writers Dr. V. Coffin of the University of Wisconsin, is perhaps most positive in his condemnation of the governor whose policy he blames for the difficulties that have more than once arisen in the working of government in this country. Dr. Coffin considers the retention of the whole body of the French civil law a mistake, holding that Massereux took the more statesmanlike course of recommending that the custom be modified by English law. It is maintained by critics of Carleton's policy that in upholding seigniorial tenure he did as much to estrange the habitants as the emissaries of the colonies did to disaffect them. TRUSTEE OF CANADA.

Guid Carleton allowed himself to be misled by the most active of the handful of English settlers in the country when he succeeded Murray, especially by men of the violent and disloyal type to which Walker belonged, the French-Canadians would more readily and completely have succumbed to the persuasions of the revolting colonists. More harshness on his part towards the "new subjects" might have changed the history of Canada; or less firmness and resourcefulness in the face of the enemy might have had a like disastrous result for British rule. But he was both the wise statesman and the brave soldier required in that supreme emergency. Of all the men who served her in North America in the latter half of the eighteenth century, none acquitted himself better than Carleton, and none placed in more trying circumstances. What was won by Wolfe would not have been held by Carleton had the latter not been great both as a chief of state, and as a man of action. In the

difficult periods covered by Carleton's two long terms of office, what other man would have proven so good a trustee of the new possession? Murray was not a constructive statesman, although he was as a military administrator. Haldimand could be trusted to maintain the order as long as there were troops at his command, but he would have been inclined to a system of "thoroughness," rather than a compromise with the governed. But Carleton satisfied all the conditions. No man has rendered greater services to the Crown in any part of the Empire, and there is none more worthy of a place among the "Makers of Canada."

A STIRRING STORY.

The subject, as we have said, is congenial to a man of Mr. Bradley's special historical studies, and is one to which his lively style is admirably suited. The story of Carleton, and of his great work as an administrator and soldier, runs smoothly from the opening of the excellent survey of the first chapter to the end of the volume. In a work dealing with the career of a man who has played a great part in the affairs of a country accounts of movements with which he was actively connected, must sometimes be broken off abruptly at an interesting point by the subject of the United Empire Loyalists. But they will be well satisfied with his treatment of such stirring characters as Ethan Allen, Montgomery and Benedict Arnold, and with his description of the repulse of the invaders at Quebec, as well as with his account of the quarrel between Carleton and Germain.

ANOTHER BANQUET IN HONOR OF MR. BAIN

Premier Thinks the Retiring Customs Official Will at Some Time Re-enter Public Life.

OTTAWA, Ont., Feb. 20.—In the senate restaurant, last evening, Hon. Mr. Patterson, Minister of Customs, gave a dinner in honor of Mr. John Bain, assistant commissioner of customs, who is leaving the Canadian service to enter commercial life. Mr. Bain occupied the place of honor at the right hand of Mr. Patterson. Sir Wilfrid Laurier was on the other side and among others present were Hon. William Templeman, Hon. Sydney Fisher, Hon. A. E. Aylesworth, Hon. Mr. Sifton, Speaker Sutherland, and a score of members of the House of Commons. In proposing Mr. Bain's health, Mr. Patterson stated that through Mr. Bain's departure Canada was losing one of the most effective public servants it had ever had. Mr. Patterson stated that the health of Mr. Bain, in connection with the Canadian government of the British syndicate, was leaving the public service and expressing great good will towards those who had been in contact with for many years.

The manicurist's table and accessories are placed on a raised platform, and the foreman of the room excuses one girl at a time, and she goes to the platform and sits down while the manicure works upon her hands, keeping the nails trimmed and every part of the hand scrupulously clean. Every one of the seventy-five girls must have their hands manicured once each day.
