DOG SAVES FAMILY

BY RINGING BELL

When Flames Appear in William Beattie's
Home Faithful Collie Arouses
the Household.

OXFORD, Pa., May 27.—A little trick
taught a pet collie dog by the children
saved the family of William Beattie,
a prosperous farmer of this section,
from death by fire. The dog saw the
house in flames and, not being able to
awaken the household by barking, seized
the rope to the dinner bell, as he
had been taught to do when summoning
the hands from the fields, and the
wailing sound of the gong aroused the
entire neighborhood.

The warning came just in time, for
the members of the family barely
escaped with their lives. Mr. Beattie
had to fight the flames while rescuing
his two children, who had been partly
overcome by smoke.

The fire started about midnight in
the southwest corner of the house, and
no theory is advanced as to its origin.
The dogs began barking, but no attention
was paid to them until the faithful
collie rang the bell. By this time
the flames had made such headway it
was impossible to save any of the fur-
niture, and Mr. Beattie was almost
overcome by the dense smoke as he
 groped his way to the third floor to
save his boys, who were stupefied by
the smoke.

The Beattie home was an old land-
mark in this neighborhood, and was
finished throughout with walnut and
mahogany from trees grown on the es-
tate.
