Italian Murderer Taken at Brown's Siding by Sheriff

Sandy Monacelli Surprised by Constables Melville and Lindsay. Was Attempting to Cross Border into Maine--with 50 Compatriots. Says He Was Provoked at Time of Shooting and Knows Nothing.

Special to The Standard. Bath, N. B., Aug. 11.—That the murder of Nicholas Legary will not go unavenged was brought within the range of probability last night with the arrest at Brown's Siding, of Sandy Monacelli, the Italian charged by the Carleton county's latest shooting of the mines.

A Crew of 18 Men. Vessels of this description carry from ten to eighteen men and it is feared here that the crew of the Myrtle have been added to swell the victims of the sea.

Later today it was learned the vessel's name is the Myrtle. She is apparently a new vessel and has not been in the water more than a couple of years.
