NEW BRUNSWICK'S CHANCE FOR GROWING OF APPLES

A. G. Turney Points Out That this Province Now Has Great Opportunity for Larger Business.

That the decline in fruit production in Canada during recent years will give New Brunswick orchardists a great opportunity to get into the English market, is the opinion of A. G. Turney, provincial horticulturist.

Mr. Turney was in the city yesterday when a Standard reporter asked him to what causes he attributed the decline of apple production in Canada shown by the census returns, a decline from 18,000,000 bushels in 1900 to 10,000,000 in 1910.

"Years ago," said Mr. Turney, "the farmers all over Canada set out small home orchards, and when the orchards came into bearing they raised large crops usually of inferior fruit. After a time the trees were attacked by fungus and insect parasites, and these pests increased in numbers the more rapidly because the trees were so numerous. At that time the farmers had no means, or no knowledge of the means of controlling these pests. Consequently the home orchards were neglected and the farmers discouraged from setting out new stock. In Ontario the acreage under orchards has fallen off rapidly mainly because of the decay of the home orchards.

"Not so long ago the specialist came on the scene in Ontario and started commercial orchards, operating on scientific lines. The old farmers seldom made any money out of his home orchard; he raised apples more for home use than for the market. The modern commercial orchardist in Ontario is making money, though their production is much smaller than the aggregate production of the multitude of home orchards used to be.

"Nova Scotia which has gone in for commercial orcharding, has increased its production of apples. New Brunswick can raise apples as good as Nova Scotia can, and it has an equal chance in the English market. The present is New Brunswick's opportunity. Ontario production has fallen off while its home markets have been enlarging rapidly, which means that it will be some years before Ontario can have any large surplus of apples to compete with the Maritime Provinces in the British market.

"In the United States the falling off of the production of apples has been even greater than in Canada, and is evidently due to the same cause—the decay of the home orchard. According to the government returns, the apple crop in the United States has fallen off from 63,000,000 bushels to 23,000,000 in the last 15 years."

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATION

Any person who is the sole head of a family or any male over 18 years of age, may acquire a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. This applicant must apply in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at that agency, on certain conditions by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of the homesteader.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister. In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$10 per acre.

Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.75 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.00.


