SCHOONER STRUCK ON QUACO LEDGE

The Alaska, 118 Tons, Now Drifting Dismasted in Bay Captain and Crew Safe at St. Martins.

The schooner Alaska, Captain Powers, was wrecked on the Quaco Ledge at 11 o'clock Thursday evening and is now drifting a derelict in the Bay of Fundy.

The Alaska left Boston in ballast for Miramichi, N. S., to load lumber on Tuesday last and during the first part of the week made good progress but on Thursday the schooner ran into a heavy southwest gale accompanied by fog.

The Alaska was a schooner of 118 tons, registered at Sackville, and was owned by J. Newton Pursey, of Miramichi, N. S. She was twenty-eight years old and was rebuilt about five years ago.

CONFER ON MATTERS OF IMMIGRATION. Representative of Norton Griffiths Consults Premier Fleming on Details of Ready-made Farm Plan.

Percy Thompson, a representative of Norton Griffiths, who has been in the province some time, studying the outlook for bringing in settlers, had a conference with Premier Fleming yesterday afternoon.

Mr. Thompson expressed himself as well pleased with the farming opportunities of such parts of the province as he has visited, and was very anxious to get information about the ready-made farm scheme of the government.

Mr. Thompson will be given an opportunity to visit the Blue Bell tract, and other districts in company with W. W. Hubbard, secretary for agriculture.

When Norton Griffiths was here some time ago, he had an interview with Premier Fleming and stated that if the government arranged for the opening of ready-made farms, he could get quite a number of families to come out and settle on them.

It is hoped that by the time Mr. Thompson returns to England he will have some definite information in regard to the communities where the ready-made farms will be established, which will prove of service in getting desirable settlers for the province.
