FRIGHTS ADVANCING.

The freight for sailing vessels are still advancing and schooner owners are making money. Schooners are getting 270 shillings to Great Britain, and it is expected to advance this week.

The term schooner Edward G. Hight, which arrived Wednesday with coal from New York, carried the record rate.

at \$3.00 and the vessel is chartered to load here for the west coast of Britain or east coast of Ireland at the splendid rate of 270 shillings.

The term schooner Anna J. Trainor has been fixed to load coal at Philadelphia for St. John at \$2.25.

The rates are now more than ten times greater than was the case before the war and an increase is reported from week to week—with no limit to the upward tendency forecasted.

INSURANCE IN SUSSEX OPERA HOUSE FIRE ONLY \$12,500

Total Loss About \$30,000—Hon. Mr. Murray Loses Books and Private Papers.

Sussex, June 8.—Nothing was saved from the Opera House building which was burned this morning, all the paraphernalia of the different societies being burned. The losses will total in the vicinity of \$30,000; insurance carried on building is as follows:

Other insurance carried was Admiral Nelson Lodge, Dominion, \$200; Iffram Preceptory Black Knights, Dominion, \$200; Maple Leaf Rehearsal, Dominion, \$200; Daniel Pober, on pool tables, Queen, \$500; Sussex Novelty Co., Occidental, \$500; Pickwick Club, Acadia, \$500; Hon. J. A. Murray on samples, North British Mercantile, \$500; Valley Lodge, House, \$500.

The total loss is estimated in the vicinity of \$30,000, and about half of which is covered by insurance.

Fredericton, June 8.—Hon. James A. Murray, Minister of Agriculture, received a telephone message this morning from Sussex to effect that his office with all its contents had been wiped out by fire which destroyed the Opera House block, Sussex, at an early hour this morning.

Hon. Mr. Murray said that nothing was saved from his office and that all his business books and private papers had been destroyed, together with furniture and other contents of office.

ANOTHER KING'S CO. MAN GIVES LIFE FOR THE EMPIRE

Sergt. J. J. Ross, of Sussex, Killed in Fighting Now in Progress at Hooze.

Sergent-Major J. J. Ross gave his life for his King and country in the recent heavy fighting in which the Canadians were engaged. He is the first Kings county boy reported in the casualty list. In a letter to his mother a short time ago he spoke cheerfully of conditions at the front. The deceased was a son of Mrs. John Marley.

Sergent-Major Ross was every inch a soldier. He served throughout the South African war, and enlisted for service early in the present conflict. Leaving his position in the I. C. R. shops at Moncton, and enlisting as a private, he quickly won recognition, and was made a sergeant. Only a short time ago he was again given a raise in rank as a result of bravery on the field, and was made sergeant-major. Ross was about thirty-seven years of age. His death will be learned with general regret. He made the biggest sacrifice that any man can make, and his name will go down in the honor roll of his native county.

Sergent-Major Ross is survived by six brothers: Robert, on active service; Michael, William, Hugh, Robert and Frank; and two sisters, Mrs. John Butterworth, Lynn, Mass., and Mrs. Sharp, Canton, Ohio. Miss Mable Marley, of Sussex, is a half-sister. Sergent-Major Ross was at one time a prominent member of the Sussex fire department.

The surviving members of the family will have every sympathy in their loss.

NORMAL SCHOOL MEDAL WINNERS

Fredericton, June 8.—York county students are the medal winners at the Provincial Normal School this year, and will be presented with their honors at the formal closing exercises and public examination which will take place tomorrow morning.

The Governor-General's silver medal for the best professional standing, among the students taking the course for first class license, has been won by Miss Margaret Baird of this city, while the bronze medal for best professional standing among the students making course for second class license has been won by Miss Jean Woodworth of Durham Bridge.

Lieut. Governor Wood will attend the exercises and will present the Governor-General's silver medal to Miss Baird, while Chief Superintendent of Education Carter will present a bronze medal to Miss Woodworth.

BERLIN MAKES NEW PROPOSALS FOR THE RELIEF OF POLES

Berlin, June 8.—(By wireless to Sayville.)—The German government has transmitted to American Ambassador Gerard, for presentation to the United States government, new proposals in connection with the plan for the distribution, by an American commission of relief in the districts of Poland occupied by the German army.

"The proposals," says an Overseas News Agency announcement today, "contain the utmost concessions which Germany is able to make. The opinion prevails in Berlin that Great Britain will also reject these proposals, upholding her former stipulations against Germany."

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS

The sole heir of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 40 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 40 acres and erect a house worth \$500.
