The man was assisting in arranging one of the strong backs of a hatch when the bight of the hawser caught him and the heavy iron swung against his leg and cut it completely off. Dr. F. L. Kenney was summoned and the man was rushed in the ambulance to the General Fublic Hospital where the necessary operation was performed and the man was reported to be doing as well as could be expected this morn-ing.


