

**World's Oldest Legislator
Passes Peacefully Away at
His Home in Fredericton--
Mind Active to the Last--
His Life Story as Told by
Himself For The Telegraph.**

W. New Brunswick—When I was sixteen years of age, my father left home for the United States and I was taken from school. My oldest brother had entered the army, and my mother, Mrs. Bay, was very young. I did not wish me to give up my studies as he hoped that when old enough he would get me a position in the office of the government. I therefore, helped on the farm and went to school alternately, and I was well qualified to clerk for the government. I was sent from him in the fall to prepare to join him the next spring. Soon after that word came that the Northwest Company and that the new company would have more servants than they required, and I was told that there would be no room for me.

"At the end of my twenty-first year I came to New Brunswick. That was the year that timber was being cut in two great industries, namely, ship building and the shipping of pine lumber. The province and only New Brunswick was a hive of industry. I found, however, that clerks were not wanted, but I went to look at the employment in the shipyards.

"I was in the office of the executive government, and at one time received general of the province. As stated above, I was in the office of the executive of the dominion in 1897, at the time of the confederation, which position he has occupied since. He has also been a member on the committee of banking commerce, which also has charge of the ways, and in the department of the printing and libraries, etc. He took an active part in reforming the national institutions of New Brunswick, and he was for 20 years a member of the college of the University of New Brunswick and he was for 20 years a member of the college of the University of New Brunswick on him the degree of doctor of laws.
