London, May 3. In Commons last night debate on Bill to repeal "Unlawful Assemblies Act" was protracted to late hour.

The motion was for a second reading. Several Irish members made speeches in defence of Home Rule.

Hartington, Secretary for Ireland, denounced Home Rule as synonymous with Fenianism.

Dr. Butt, member for Limerick, indignantly denied he was a Fenian, and demanded a retraction from Hartington. He wanted for Ireland a Local Government like that of the United States and for the King a national Legislature similar to American Congress.

Gladstone said the latter scheme was impracticable. American statesmen were divided in opinion as to its wisdom. The recent civil war in the United States grew out of collisions which the system involved. The motion was rejected 17 to 145.

The strike of Liverpool cartmen ended by the masters conceding.
