The Hon. Edward Willis gives an unqualified denial to the story that the Local Government had agreed, in case Mr. Skinner were defeated, to resign his office of Judge of Probates. Such action on the part of the Local Government would place them on a par with the present Nova Scotia "Reform" Government (which resigned Mr. Morse, of Amherst, after he had been used as a candidate against Hon. Dr. Tupper at the last election), and we don't think Hon. George E. King and his colleagues can afford to introduce "Reform" principles into the New Brunswick Executive. Such a course would be a declaration of war on the General Government—a course no St. John Liberal would justify—a course which no one but a "Reformist" could justify consistently. But when members of the Local Government, in their character of electors, choose to aid the candidates whom they regard as the best, we believe they have the right to do so. The slander was the invention of people so hungry for some kind of office that they imagine Mr. Skinner would be greatly grieved at the loss of his judgeship of Probates. The fact is that Mr. Skinner has long contemplated resigning the appointment, so that he might be perfectly free to take an active part in politics.

A dispatch to a Government paper says "the corruptness concentrated all their forces on Lennox," and the Government supporters are to have Hon. R. J. Cartwright, who was elected by a majority of 800. Our Saturday telegraph showed his election to be certain. Mr. Cartwright retained a great many of his Conservative supporters by promising himself a Conservative still, and, of course, all those who had been hostile to Sir John Macdonald voted for him.

Now that the Liberal party have needed not to contest this constituency the Government supporters are to have a grand jubilee in Smith's Hall. Many Liberals will doubtless attend from curiosity. It would have been more mainly if the party had held a public meeting and proclaimed their principles (if they have any) when an Opposition candidate was in the field.

Not a single arrest was made at the Institute Friday evening, during the disgraceful scenes enacted there, and a single arrest was allowed, although the police and others interested in representing rowdiness must know the names of many of the cushion throwers and pea sowers. What security have we now that order will be kept at any public entertainment? The Police Committee of the Common Council should investigate the matter. Are police officers to do nothing but save drunken men from freezing to death in the gutters, arrest boys for sliding down hills, and report illegal liquor sales? If they are not to interfere with dress reformers engaged in destroying property in a public hall and prevent a politician who that others have paid their money to see we should like to know it. The police force of St. John is sternly discredited by the failure of the squad at the Institute on Friday evening to make any arrests.

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A joint stock company has been organized in France to tunnel the Straits of Dover, and connect England with France by rail. Two hundred and twenty-six lives lost! Such is the telegraphic statement that comes to us to-day. The Ville de Havre has sunk at sea, and two hundred and twenty-six human beings have perished in her. This is an age of horrors—maritime horrors particularly. Science has increased the speed of steamers wonderfully, but it does not appear to have lessened the dangers of ocean travel much.

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Shipping Notes.
The schooner *Marie Cronis*, of New Brunswick, N. S., Collins, master, at New York, 27th Inst., from Aux Cayes, reports that on the 25th inst., in a heavy N. W. gale, they lost about 50 tons of logwood from off the deck and split sails.
The schooner *M. L. S. Plover*, Carter, master, at Wilmington, N. C., on the 24th inst., from Cardenas, reports having experienced heavy weather south of Frying Pan Shoals, on the night of the 16th inst., during which she carried away mainboom, foremast, mizzenmast and jib.

Wreck Staff.—The schooner *Vesta*, at Boston from the 20th inst., N. B., reports that on the 23rd inst., about 8 miles north of Boon Island, they passed a quantity of barrels of beef of pork and boxes of raisins, also portions of bulwarks, about 50 feet of rail, a cabin stool and other wreck stuff.

The schooner *Annie Martha*, Bissett, master, from Sydney, C. B., for this port with coal, sank at Dipper Harbor on the morning of Saturday the 29th inst., the Captain and crew escaping in their boat. They arrived here yesterday. They report that the vessel sprang leak about 30 miles from this port; every effort was put forth to keep the schooner free until they could reach a harbor of refuge, but finding it useless they took to the boat and landed at Dipper Harbor. The *A. M.* registered 126 tons, was built at Kingston, N. C., in 1870, and was owned by John Cotter of this city.

New Vessels.—A handsomely modelled bark of 508 tons register has just been completed at the yard of James Crowe, Esq., Hantsport, N. S., and will be launched in a few days. She is under charter to carry a cargo of grain from New York, and will proceed to that port in ballast immediately on being launched.
A fine bark named the *Finch*, registered 550 tons, was launched at McMillan's Cove, Digby, N. S., on the 22nd inst. She is copper-fastened, fully iron-kneed and classed 8 years French Vintas. She is owned in Yarmouth.

Halifax Lightship.—The Halifax lightship has been removed from her position at the mouth of that harbor. She was towed up to the city by the Dominion steamer *Lady Head*.

Lovers of horseflesh—trotting horseflesh in particular—will be pleased to hear of the arrival in St. John of the fastest trotting stallion ever in the Province. The horse *Mambino Chief* is owned by Messrs. Wright, Seavey & Co., of Boston, and they have made arrangements to allow the horse to remain here about a year for the benefit of stock raisers who have of late adopted the plan of sending their mares to the United States in order to improve the quality of their colts. The horse arrived here Friday night, and was at once taken to the best trotting horse ever imported from England, and had the same blood that runs in *Lady Thorne*, *Dexter*, and other fast trotters. His best public record as a trotter is 2:30 in Boston, in 1893, and in private he has made 2:25, though he has never been trained for racing purposes. He is a dark bay, with two white hind feet, and stands about sixteen hands high. Among his colts we expect to see insignificant trotters, and perhaps not a few Crown Prince may be raised to make New Brunswick horses still better known to the world.

Hanged for Killing the Wrong Man.
(From the Columbus (Ga.) Sun.)
Parties who arrived from Caserta, (Chattahoochee county), on the 21st inst., report the hanging at that place of Hudson Balford, a colored man, who killed Mr. Frank Galloway. He was sentenced at the last term of the Superior Court, and is the only person executed in this circuit since Judge Johnson presided. The evidence showed he was very mad with another negro; that he had got a gun, fired upon a fence and killed Mr. Galloway. The negro he wanted to kill had just gone into his cabin. After the jury had brought in a verdict of guilty, the condemned man knelt in the court room and begged for mercy, saying he was mad with the negro, but had nothing against Mr. Galloway, and did not mean to kill him. After he had pronounced the death sentence, Judge Johnson wrote to Gov. Smith, asking that the sentence be commuted to imprisonment for life. The Governor declined, and yesterday the execution took place according to law. Present at the execution were thousands of people. We are informed the criminal made about the same statement as before the court. He had murdered in his heart, and meant to kill the negro and not Mr. Galloway.
