EXPRESS HITS AUTOMOBILE
Dr. Glenn Seriously Hurt at Newbury Railway Crossing

Newbury, Oct. 12.—An accident happened at noon Monday on the G. T. R. tracks here. Dr. O. J. Glenn was returning to Wardsville and on approaching the track he saw an express going west and stopped his car, allowing it to pass. He then started to cross, not seeing another express going east till it was on him. The express struck the auto, taking the back and top clean off. The doctor was thrown out and how he escaped instant death is a wonder. He was able to get up but for a moment was dazed and bleeding profusely from cuts on his face and behind the ear. Elmer Connolly, who saw the train hit the car, ran to the doctor's assistance and then took him out home in his car. Doctors were called from Rodney and the injured man made as comfortable as possible. The express was brought to a standstill in a few car lengths. The crossing here has no protection and this is only another evidence of how necessary it is there should be some.

LIGHTNING BURNS BARN

PLAN TO FORCE U. S. WHEAT UP TO \$3
Wichita, Kan., Oct. 11.—The Wheat Growers' Association of the United States, with a membership of 70,000 in Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas, Nebraska and South Dakota, has issued from its office here a proclamation to all its members urging them to refrain from selling any wheat after 8 p. m. on October 25, until such time as the price of good wheat is raised to \$3 a bushel at growers' terminal.

Want \$2.50 in Canada
Calgary, Oct. 11.—The setting of a minimum price for wheat, which should be not less than \$2.50 a bushel, is probably the only means now open to the Government to counteract the ill-effect of the abolition of the wheat board. This is the opinion of H. W. Wood, president of the United Farmers of Alberta.
