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

ATTACK ON THE HOUSE OF LORDS

ir. Henry Labouchere Champion of the First-Sir H. Campbell-Banner the New Leader, Takes the Second and Defeat of the Proposed

London, Feb 14.—In the House of Commons yesterday Mr. Henry Labou-here, Liberal member for Northampton, nade his annual attack on the House

chere, Liberal member for Northampton, made his annual attack on the House of Lords, with a view of limiting its veto power, from which, he said, Liberal measures invariably suffered. He moved an amendment to the address to the throne providing that bills adopted by the Commons in one session and not adopted by the Peers, should, if repassed by the Commons at a subsequent session, become the law of the land.

After a discussion of Mr. Labouchere's amendment, Mr. John Lawson Walton, Liberal member for South Leeds, proposed an amendment to the address, declaring that the powers now pessessed by the House of Lords of overruling the decision of the House of Commons demanded urgent attention of Parliament. Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman, the newly-elected leader of the Liberals in the Commons, supported the Walton amendment. In the course of a vigorous speech he denied that the Liberals were actuated by partisan spirit in raising the question, but the House of Lords, he declared, had always formed a continuous and stereotyped anti-Liberal majority. "On patroide and constitutional grounds," said Sir Henry, "the situation is full of danger; and no dispassionate man can deny the anomally and absurdity of a House of Lords in the face of a representative system of Government. The Liberals desire to guard the rights of the representative chamber, while giving to the House of Peers a reasonable power or criticism and advice."

Balfour, Government leader, said there was no middle course between the policy expressed in Mr. Labouchere's amendment and the policy of leaving the House of Peers in its present position. He declared it to be his firm conviction that the Liberals, in proposing constitutional reform, were really acting in the interests of the party.

The House then rejected both amendments—Mr. Waltou's by 257 against 107, and Mr. Labouchere's by 233 against 105.

CANADA AT PARIS.

he Exact Space the Dominion Is Get Is at Last Fixed-Our Largest Display.

Ottawa, Feb. 14.—The result of recent negotiations between the Hon. Mr. Fisher, president of the Canadian board of commissioners, and Lord Strathcona, representative of Canada on the Imperial royal commission executive, is that Can-ada is to get 12,000 square feet of space in the general buildings at the Paris exhibi-tion, instead of 15,000 feet as had been pretyously announced, and in lieu thereof the general buildings at a ratio cannot then, instead of 15,000 feet as had been previously announced, and in lieu thereof 3,000 feet additional space is granted in the colonial building. This will make the total amount of space allotted to Canada in the colonial building 27,100 feet, the greater part of the 36,000 feet countained in this building. In the general and the colonial sections the space, as before, aggregates 39,100 square feet. It has been arranged that the Canadian exhibits in the colonial building will compete with the rest of the world, and receive awards just as if they were shown side by side with them in the general buildings. The lawing lines, indicated approximately in the order of their importance: Farinactous products, general and their derival the order of their importance: Farinarious products, general and their derivatives; preserved goods, including a small proportion of beverages; the working of mines, quarties and their products; agricultural implements, processes; raw agricultural products, animal and vegetable; taxtile fabrics, cottons and woollens, and clothing generally, together with the plants and processes; products of the forest, bunting and sporting equipments, game, etc., including fishing appliances, tackle products and fish culture; carriages, wheelwrights' work, bicycles, etc.; railway and tramway plant. Next in order of the distribution of space by the board of commissioners are: Horticul-

board of commissioners are: Horticul tural products, plants and tree culture tural products, plants and tree culture, nursery seeds and stock; the exhibit of pulp and paper; household and art furniture; ranges, furnaces and heating apparatus generally; clucation, musical instruments. There are smaller exhibits of photography, electricity, boats and cances, fruits and fruit trees, metal working, carpentry and joinery, leather and skins, tobacco and matches. The board of commissioners met here yesterday in the office of the Minister of Agriculture, and have about completed the work of selecting the various classes and making a proportional allotment of the available space among them. Special work has been assigned to each commissioner, who will report to the board the lat of March.

The first clause proviles that in case of the discovery of a scale in nursery stock, the nurseryman is to be notified not to dispose of any of the stock till the inspector makes a full examination and reports it is safe to do so. A second provision permits the destruction of orchards, the trees of which are evidently infected, upon the report of the inspectors. The shirl provision, however, is the main one, and is directed not only against the scale, but also against all insect pests. It has been found that the nurseries are the breeding ground of these pests. Accordingly, the bill requires that all nursery stocks, whether grown in the country or imported, shall be funificated with hydrocyanic acid gas.
