Having received a Report from the Wesident at It Regis of certain disorderly proceedings on the part of the American maian lettlers. I deemed it advisable to visit that bellage, accompanied by mr Superintent Thughes, for the purpose of Enquiring into the circumstances depresented by m. Chesley, and of ascertaining Whether there were any and what grounds for a request preferred by him, in the name of the British Chiefs, that steps might be taken to inforce the removal of the American portrow of the Troquois tribe from It Regis.
