Governments of India, China and Japan.

In 1895 Mr. King was made a "C. M. G." (Companion of the Order of St. Michael and St. George) by the late King Edward VII in recognition of his public services. Later he was elected by the Imperial Government as one of the British delegates to the International Opium Conference which met at Shanghai, China, in 1908, and presided ever by Bishop Brent of the United States. In 1910 he was chosen a Fellow of the Royal Society of Canada, and in 1911 was made the President of the Ontario Reform Association, which position he still holds. He also organized and is Chairman of the Canadian Association for International Conciliation. Having been a Cabinet Minister in a Canadian Administration, Mr. King remains a member of the Privy council of Canada for life.
