difficulty whatever we do. It will be very difficult to avoid some action without a tremendous cry from the "fifth column" alarmists. On the other hand, if we take action parallel to that of the United States and require a passport and Consular visa from every United States citizen entering Canada, we must face the fact that it will kill 95% of our tourist traffic. We have been counting, perhaps optimistically, on obtaining in this way \$200,000,000 vitally needed for the purchase of essential war requirements in the United States. We cannot borrow there; we are already sending all our gold; we cannot materially increase our exports. The strain may mean the rapid depreciation of the Canadian dollar.
