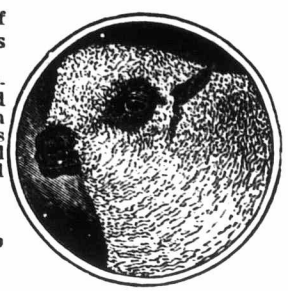

STOCK GOSSIP.
In writing to advertisers please mention the Farmer's Advocate

As many of our readers are aware, Mr. Hawkshaw, of Glanworth, is in England selecting another lot of Shropshires. In a letter dated from Shrewsbury, he informs us that he has completed purchasing what sheep he requires for this shipment, and that they have all been bred to a ram from the flock of E. Bowen Jones, that is half brother to the ram sold to Messrs. Thomas for \$1,000, and for which they have recently refused the sum of \$500 additional. Mr. Hawkshaw expected to sail in the Sarnia on 27th October.

In a letter just received from Mr. J. T. Gibson, Denfield, Ont., he says: Has not Canada done extra well at the "Big Fair"? It should advertise her and show the world what we can produce in a land which is often termed a country of snowbanks. We sent six Lincolns to Central America, good ones, of our own raising; if that climate is suitable for sheep raising, the sale should open up a profitable trade. We sold six to go to Iowa; the 1st prize ram lamb, both at Toronto and Chicago, is gone to Michigan. Since our return we have put our ewes in with the 1st prize 1, 2 and 3-year-old rams at Chicago, and Ribby Conqueror. Few breeders ever had four such rams at one time. Trade has been good in rams and slow in ewes. We expect to make more sales later on; have enquiries from most of the States and a number from Canada. Lincolns are wanted. With the improvement of the money market they will sell, and sell at profitable prices. It may be some time before we show thirty such sheep as we showed in Chicago. I was told by a good judge that they were thirty of the best long-wooled sheep ever shown by one firm at one time in America. We broke the record, being the only firm taking every first.
