C. ditto, \$12 to 12.50; sea trout, \$9 to 9.50.

FURS.—There is no special activity in this line beyond a fair demand for bear, otter, and

GROCERIES — Trade can only be called fair, the very wet open weather having interfered with traveller's movements in the interior, and kept the farming community at home; money is rather slow in coming in. Sugars are steady at prices of the last few weeks; granulated is still 7½c. per lb. at refinery to the wholesale trade, while yellows range from 5½ to 6½c., there is a good supply of all grades; syrups, dull, at 3½ to 4c. The agreement cently made among the trade as to the price of Barbadoes molasses seems to be generally adhered to, the price being fixed at 47½c. per gal. in publisheons and in barrels 51c. Teas are moving pretty fairly at steady prices; a cable from Japan received by a local teas broker announces an advance in the common sorts equal to about 2 cents a pound, and there is no chance of any lower prices prevailing, but everything points to a stiffer market. Blacks are very firm in London, and 7¾d. is now asked for goods lately at 6d. In coffees there is nothing specially new. Dried fruits are firmer both in London and Denia.
