ST. LAWRENCE AND ATLANTIC RAIL-ROAD.

The Board of Directors, on Saturday last, with cently from Portland, proceeding to a distance of twenty-two miles from Longueuil. The ground was every where covered with glare ice from the sleet and rain followed by a sharp frost of the preceding night, and a heavy ram fell from one o'clock throughout the remainder of the day. Notwithstanding these discourage-ments, the party were well pleased with their excursion. Speed was not the object of the experiment so much as a trial of the general working powers of all the separate parts of the machinery, and several stoppages for the purpose of examination took place. The train, notwitstanding, arrived at the bridge over the Richelieu, at Rouville, sixteen miles of the road, in 45 minutes -giving a rate of about 22 miles in the hour.--On one portion of the rail, a space of three miles was run over in six minutes,-a rate of speed equal to thirty miles an hour.
