A Commission under the Great Scal, appointing the Honourable Jonathan Bliss, John Saunders, Ward Chipman, and John Murray Bliss, Esquires, orany one or more of them, Commissioners for the purpose of administering the oaths prescribed by Law, being produced---when the Honourable John Saunders, one of the Commissioners named therein, attending, the following Members took the oaths and subscribed the declaration, to wit : Peter Fraser, John Allen, John Dow, Stair Agnew, Hugh Johnston, jun. Harry Peters, Ward Chipman, Andrew S. Ritchie, John M. Wilmot, Charles Simonais, William Botsford, Rufus Smith, Joseph Crandal, Benjamin Wilson, Hugh Mackay. John Cambbell, Peter Stubs, Joseph N. Clarke, John Cougle Vail, David B. Wetmore, Samuel Sensit, William Peters, Elijah Miles, Amos Perley, Hugh Munro, Esquires, who took their seats.

Menophon Jonett, Esquire, Gentleman Usber of the Black Rod, delivered the

following Message:

His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor, commands the immediate attendance " of this Honourable House in the Council Chamber."

The House attended accordingly---when the Honourable Ionathan Eliss, Chief Justice, spoke as follows:

" Gentlemen of the Council and Assembly,

" His Excellency has been pleased to command me to acquaint you, that he "doth not think fit to declare the causes of summoning this General Assembly till "there shall be a Speaker of the House of Assembly: It is therefore His Excellency's "pleasure, that you, Gentlemen of the Assembly, do repair to the place where the " Assembly usually sit, and there choose a fit person to be your Speaker, and that you " present the person who shall be chosen, to His Excellency, for his approbation, " immediately.

The House having returned---Mr. Agnew rose, and addressing himself to the

Clerk, said,

" Mr. Weimore,

" The Speaker of the House of Assembly ought to be, if possible, a professional "character of the Law: He ought, Sir, to be a man of fortune, with urbanity, "sufficient to make acceptable, an enlightened understanding, and firmness enough " to maintain the order and dignity of the House. With these sentiments, I move

" that William Botsford, Esquire, be Speaker of this House."

Which motion being seconded by Mr. Peters, and the House appearing to be unanimous, Mr. Botsford was taken from his seat, and conducted to the Chair; and when on the steps, he said, "That he was deeply impressed with the confidence re-" posed in him by the House, in electing him to one of the most important situations " that could be held by a subject. In the expectation that his conduct would at all "times meet with the indulgence of the House, he would cheerfully submit to their " wishes."

Whereupon Mr. Speaker elect, with the House, attended His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor; and being returned, Mr. Speaker reported that he had addressed His Excellency to the effect following:

" May it please your Excellency, "The House of Assembly of this Province, in obedience to your Excellency's " command, and in the exercise of their acknowledged right, have proceeded to the "choice of their Speaker; and now humbly attend to present me to your Excellency "as the person elected. Being conscious of my own inability to perform the duties "-of so important and arduous a station, I trust that your Excellency will be pleased " to disprove of their choice, and command them to elect a person more capable." When the Honourable Chief Justice, spoke as follows:

" I am commanded by His Excellency to acquaint you, that he hath so good an opinion of your integrity, diligence, and sufficiency for executing the important
