The stock market has been very dull this week and there are few changes in prices to report with the exception, perhaps, of Deer Park, which has declined two cents and there is a large block offering today at the decline; Iron Colt has taken a considerable slump. having been offered on the exchange without buyers at 121/c.

A good strike has been reported on the White Bear. The shaft is now down 140 feet. The work on this mine is about the most compact of any in the camp. The stock has been offered freely at 12c. but we look for considerable advance in this stock in the near future. St. Elmo has remained steady around 7c. There is some talk of negotiations pending for the sale of this property. but should the sale go through it will not be at less than 15c. per share. There is again talk of the Le Roi being sold to English capitalists. The price mentioned this time is \$5,000,000. Dundee holds its own in the market. Of the there are only 5,000 left and the next block to be put on will be 25.000 at 25c. The wagon road from Quartz creek up to the mine is now completed and the machinery will, in all probability, be in place in the course of the next two

weeks. Real estate here is again beginning to move. Several large transactions having been reported within the last few days. Thompson Avenue is now being graded and there is considerable enquiry for lots on building conditions on this avenue.
