LONDON VICTORY
WAS DECISIVEEast Middlesex Also Gave
Unionist Victory—Dun-
can Ross in West

London, Ont. Dec. 17.—London and East Middlesex swung to Union Government most decisively. Major Hume, Cronyn won by 1,690 majority in the city, one of the largest ever obtained here, defeating Mr. George S. Gibson, U.P. Liberal-Labor nominee. The total vote polled was 14,786, an abnormally large figure for London, the respective votes being: Cronyn's 8,238; Gibbons 6,548. Major Cronyn's victory was celebrated by the victors, while the defeated ones took consolation in the fact that they had fought a clean, though vigorous campaign.

The return of Mr. S. F. Glass as member for East Middlesex occasioned less surprise than the election of the city representative, as his opponent, Mr. J. M. Ross of Lucan was not so well known, having been in the field only a few months. It is surmised that a large percentage of the woman vote went to the Union Government. The Conservative majority in 1911 was 994, but besides the woman vote this time there was a large addition to the suburban population.

The majorities to-day were:—For Glass—London township, 366; West Nissouri, 61; North Dorchester, 132;

Biddulph, 177; Lucan, 60; city of London annex, 374.
For Ross—Westminster, 163. Net majority for Glass, 1,007.

Mr. George Elliott, ex-M.P., Unionist, for the former riding of North Middlesex, ran against Mr. Duncan Ross of West Middlesex, the latter winning by about 700 majority.
