

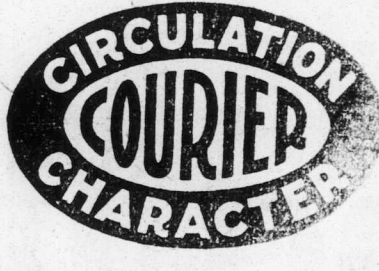

Travellers from Germany bring an account of a recent conference at Berlin at which Field Marshal von Hindenburg received the editors of thirty German newspapers and discussed the food situation with them. The editors told von Hindenburg that by next May there would be no food in Germany. "My reply is," said the Field Marshal, "that by next April I shall be in Paris."

## Business Men Approve M.H.C. Vocational Work

### Shoe Repairing Commended as a Solution of Economy Problem With High Prices

The opportunity given the chiefs in many lines of work to visit the vocational training centres of the Military Hospitals Commission is leading to many helpful suggestions and a widening of the general interest in the returned soldier problem.

Industrial surveys by which to adapt vocational training courses to the needs of the industrial situation in different districts have been undertaken by the vocational branch of the commission, and care has been taken to establish only courses in which the demand for labor is sufficient to assure positions for the men at the conclusion of their course. The general endorsement of men and business men upon viewing the work has been very gratifying to the Commission.

**Comment from Business World.** The editor of "The Commercial," a magazine with a wide circulation among merchants was lately a guest at a luncheon for business men given by Col. Cook, O.C. of "G" Unit at Tuxedo Park at the convalescent centre at Winnipeg.

He comments editorially on the work in a recent issue, as follows: "The work that the Military Hospitals Commission is accomplishing truly is a wonderful one. Out at Tuxedo Park at Winnipeg, there are hundreds of men all discharged from the army, learning new trades. These include: Blacksmithing, shoemaking and typewriting, English, grammar, woodworking, bookkeeping, building, and architecture, signwriting, electricity, gas engines, shoe repairing and so forth. The men are kept at these courses until they are efficient. They are trained by specialists and it does not cost the boys a cent. In fact, they are given a liberal allowance during the time they attend these courses.

**Must Repair Expensive Shoes.** "One course in particular struck us as being a good one just now. That was the shoe repairing course. With the high price of boots and shoes, the Commercial believes there is a splendid opportunity right there for our returned heroes.

"The shoe repair business was never in a more flourishing condition—its only difficulty being in securing help. The condition of the leather market is at the present time of secondary importance to this question of labor. The education given in the shoe repairing course is very thorough and complete, covering, as it does, a period of six months. During this period the soldier is drawing a good salary and upon completion of his course, there is an active demand for his services at the current rates—usually \$17 to \$20 a week. There is, therefore, every inducement for the boys to take up this class of work and it is the earnest desire of repair shop proprietors that they be trained as quickly as possible as the demand for good men is greatly in excess of the supply."

**Valuable Abilities Developed.** Some men must receive the necessary instruction in a university. If this is so, the vocational experts arrange for him to have the course. Other men will regain independence by learning in some factory a trade related to their previous occupation. Still others will go on the land, where they can be most efficient. Who ever they are, the course is given with the realization that the man's most valuable abilities are to be developed not only for his welfare but for Canada's.

**Next Call Soon.** By Courier Leased Wire. Washington, Feb. 4.—Provost Marshal General Crowder to-day announced that the movement of the last increments of men selected in the first draft will begin in on February 23 and continue for a period of five days. This will complete the operation of the first draft, as all states will have furnished their quotas. The movement will bring the strength of the national army up to 685,000 men contemplated in the first draft.

**AMERICAN OPINION.** The "Wall Street Journal" publishes a leading editorial on what is described as a "flare-up in Western Canada over the agitation for government ownership of all the railways, including the Canadian Pacific."

"Not all of the co-operative socialists, advocates of state socialism and proponents of what is called 'communism,' from all the farmers, mercantile and lumber associations combined, could transfer the Canadian Pacific Railroad to the Government, even were the Government itself willing," the editorial insists. "They could eat it up, but they could not hold it a single instant, as it is known to-day and at its value to them to-day, after they got it. . . . Canadian need not go one step beyond their own border to decide whether a government-owned road can maintain its most valuable asset. It is just because it cannot be done that part of the prairie press has for some months past wished to make up the deficits of the government-owned roads by expropriating the Canadian Pacific's current profits. The idea is a chimera. There would be no profits to divide up."

**MANY COURSES FOR MAIMED SOLDIERS**  
**M. H. C. Curriculum Expands with New Needs; All Co-Operating**

The elasticity of the work offered by the vocational training branch of the Military Hospitals Commission in its efforts to meet the needs of every soldier who returns a Canada disabled as to require a new vocation adapted to his altered condition, can be measured in some degree by the figures lately compiled showing that 84 different courses are now being taken.

The work is largely individual although in some courses greatly in demand classes are conducted. These include motor mechanics, tool-making, draughting, book-keeping and commercial work, shoe-making, agriculture, etc., and sometimes the enrolment in certain classes is over a score.

The courses are listed under five heads, agricultural trades, professional, mechanical and miscellaneous. Some are being taken in universities, some in factories, some on the land, some in the schools specially established by the M. H. C. All are roads to independence and a new livelihood.

**Many Moulds.** The vocational experts are not trying to turn maimed men into a few set moulds but to afford every man the particular training required to best utilize his previous experience and secure his future. This aim is accountable for the breach between a course in saxophone instruction given to a Montreal piano teacher whose shoulder was shattered in France, and boiler-making for a laborer with mechanical ingenuity who lost a leg.

**SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS**  
The sole head of a family, or any man over 18 years old, who was at the commencement of 1917, and who has since continued to be a British subject or a subject of an allied or neutral country, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion Land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for District. Entry by proxy may be made on certain conditions. Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of land in each of three years.

In certain districts a homesteader may secure an adjoining quarter-section as pre-emption. Price \$300 per acre. Duties—reside six months in each of three years after earning homestead patent and cultivate 50 acres extra. May obtain pre-emption patent as soon as homestead patent on certain conditions.

A settler after obtaining homestead patent, if he cannot secure a pre-emption, may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$300 per acre. Must reside six months in each of three years cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$200.00.

Holders of entries may count time of employment as farm labourers in Canada during 1917, as residence duties under certain conditions.

When Dominion Lands are advertised or posted for entry, returned soldiers who have served overseas and have been honorably discharged, receive entry priority in applying for entry at local Agency Office (the Post Sub-Agency in Discharge Papers must be presented to Agent).

If they did, no one would suffer more than the great farming classes of the west whose exports would no longer receive price stimulation from a growing foreign investment market which constantly rectifies the inequalities of adverse Canadian trade balances. Western Canada's deadliest enemy has been the ghost of single tax. It has successfully withstood that temptation to reaction and decay. On grounds of both good faith and expediency, it will not "Trans-continentalize" the Canadian Pacific.
