ANOTHER YUKON MURDER

Body Perforated by Bullets Found in River Twenty-Two Miles Above Dawson—No Clue to Victim's Identity—Large Man Upwards of Forty.

That another murder has been committed on the Yukon and the body consigned to the water there is no doubt. Inspector Howard conducted an inquest on the remains last night before the following jury: R. L. Cowan, M. Rogers, E. E. Tiffin, J. D. Bell, W. R. King and George Madey. The evidence submitted at the inquest was practically as stated above the witnesses being Corporal Piper, Sergeant Telford and Dr. MacArthur. The jury brought in the following verdict: "We the jurors find that deceased came to his death by bullet wounds at the hands of some person or persons unknown."

The body was turned over to the undertaker and buried last night but will again be disinterred should it be found necessary to establish identity. The police will immediately go to work to ferret out the mystery of what is undoubtedly a murder and evidently a cold-blooded one. While the task seems a hopeless one, others fully as hopeless, the O'Brien murders for example, have been ferreted until the meshes were woven into a web of facts that no evidence could puncture. The Yukon has faith in her excellent police service and the chances are even now that unless the perpetrator of this last fearful crime has left the country and is far away he or they will be brought to justice. A broad field for fine detective work is now open.

REPORTS ARE STILL GOOD

King's Condition Very Satisfactory

Will Remain on Royal Yacht Off Cowes Until Day of Coronation.

BRODERICK'S PLAIN TALK

Regarding Buller's Actions on Field

Advised White to Surrender When Latter Could Hold Out for 70 Days.

London, July 17.—In the columns this afternoon the Buller controversy was again introduced on the war office vote, Sir Edward Grey, liberal, charging the office with having acted unfairly towards Buller and demanding the additional correspondence. Broderick, secretary of the war office, replied that shattering remnants were dismissed owing to the general's reputation. He opposed the publication of further documents, saying they could only prove Buller guilty of prepossession that had been listened to would have brought disgrace upon British arms without parallel in history. When Buller sent his note of despair to White advising his surrender he had a hologram in his pocket that White could hold out seventy days and had food for that time.
