WATERVILLE HERO KILLED IN FRANCE

Waterville, July 27—Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Swift, of Waterville, Kings Co., have received official news that their son, Otis, aged twenty, was on July 3rd accidentally killed in France. Otis crossed to Europe with the 6th C. M. R. in the autumn of 1915, and was there in the company under command of Captain Henry H. Pineo. Having just returned from severe fighting in the trenches, and while engaged in despatch service on a bicycle he was overrun by a motor-lorrie and instantly killed. Letters since received from Major Chaplain A. W. Woods and Captain Pineo, speak very highly of Otis as a soldier, and of the excellent service rendered by him. He was buried with military honors on July 4th in the military cemetery to the rear—the general, the colonel, and other officers under whom he served, as well as his own company, being in attendance. It is pleasing to note from the letters received—the regard, honor and care given, where possible, to the bodies of fallen heroes.
