## CONSTRUCTION BOARD OF TRADE

In Response to Efforts Made by A. E. Whitmore, M.L.A., and Others, the C.P.R. Will Build West From Weyburn.

The farmers west of Weyburn are to have some relief in the way of railways before the end of the year. The C.P.R. will build at least twenty miles west from Weyburn this year on their proposed line from Weyburn to Lethbridge, and the thanks of the farmers residing in that part of the country are due to A. E. Whitmore, M.L.A. for his untiring efforts in their behalf. While this line has been mooted for some time the first action to get it built at once was taken last fall when Mr. Whitmore met the members of the Weyburn board of trade and discussed the situation with them. Petitions were drawn up and circulated. These were signed by thousands of persons interested. Delegations took these petitions to Winnipeg and met Mr. Whyte, second vice president of the company, who as a result of the interview took the matter up with the president and board of directors when he went east. ## WINTER FAIR AT COAST

Alberta Grain Men Want to Ship Grain by the Pacific, and Recommend Dominion Government to Build Terminal Elevators at Coast.

Calgary, Alta., Feb. 4.—The entire time of the western grain movement was taken up this morning by an address of S. P. Strong, president of the Alberta Pacific Elevator Company, of Calgary. In a forceful manner Mr. Strong showed that if sufficient terminal elevators and storage facilities were built in Vancouver the Liverpool and other grain markets of the world would take all the Alberta wheat that the farmers of the west can grow. A fairly good business has already been established between Calgary and Liverpool via Vancouver, but owing to the expensive method of loading and lack of terminal elevators the trade is not as profitable as it can be made. Mr. Strong pointed out that the rate to Liverpool via Montreal or St. John is 55 cents a bushel, and via Vancouver, the Horn or the Suez canal only 45 cents. This rate will be materially reduced when the Panama canal is completed.  
The conference continued its business this afternoon by adopting the following resolutions: "Resolved that in order to facilitate the immediate erection of a terminal elevator on the Pacific coast through which Alberta grain can be profitably exported to the markets of the world, this convention urge the erection of a terminal elevator at once by the Dominion government, said elevator to be owned, operated and controlled by the government, and that this resolution be sent to the government at once asking a reply as soon as possible, and further, in case the Dominion government refuse to grant the request to erect a terminal elevator at the coast, we, after a reasonable delay, urge the C.P.R. to undertake the work in order that the elevator be ready to handle the crop of 1909, and elevators so erected to be under the direct control of the government and that no steps be taken to carry this resolution into effect until an answer is received from the government."
