The Late Geo. Earley.
 We had only room last week for a mere mention of the death of one of Farmersville's oldest inhabitants, which took place on the 7th inst. Mr. Karley, the subject of this sketch, came to the country with his parents from Ireland in 1840, and settled in the township of Kitley, subsequently removing to the 11th concession of Elizabethtown. In this township he resided until 18 years ago, when he moved to Farmersville and engaged in the manufacture of cheese, and also in a mercantile business. In the pursuit of his business of cheese buying he crossed the Atlantic several times, and during the crash in the cheese trade he lost heavily. He finally went out of business and lived retired until his death. The funeral, which took place on Wednesday last, from his late residence to Christ's Church here, was very largely attended. The Orange Lodge, of which deceased was a member, took charge of the obsequies. The Rev. Mr. Jones preached a plain and practical funeral sermon, after which the procession retired from the church and the remains were interred in the cemetery vault. Peace to his ashes.

High School Literary Society.
 On Friday afternoon last, the second entertainment under the auspices of the above named society took place in one of the school rooms of the High School. Mr. W. Miss Etta Hutcheson gave an instrumental selection in good style. A dialogue by the Misses Richards, Mulcaugh and Ripley, entitled "Temptation," was well true to life. A duet by Misses Hutchison and Mealy, was very good. "A Story of the War," by Master W. A. Johnston, whom the chairman introduced as the smallest scholar attending the High School, was given with a distinctness not excelled by older members. A solo by Miss Richards, entitled "We'd better hide a wee," was a splendid rendering of a popular song. A recitation by J. W. Johnston "Defence of the bridge," was spoken in a clear, distinct voice, which was heard all over the room. A reading by R. Richmond, entitled "Jimmy Butler and the owl" brought down the house. A recitation by Miss Moxley, "Parody on Lord Ullin's daughter," was given in a style that places Miss Moxley in the front rank as an amateur orationist. The closing piece of the programme was a reading by P. H. Eaton, on "Triumphs of the English tongue." A few words of commendation and criticism from a Reporter representative and from Principal Johnston, followed by God save the Queen, brought a very pleasant afternoon entertainment to a close.

MR. TAYLOR'S MEETING.
 Monday evening the town hall was crowded, on the occasion of a public meeting, addressed by Mr. Taylor. The chair was filled by Dr. Addison.

Mr. Taylor delivered a long speech in which some of the public questions of the day were muddled and misrepresented in an astonishing way. In referring to the public debt he gave figures which were the small fraction of \$60,000,000 below the truth, in order to make out as good a case as possible for his party. He denied emphatically several charges which had been brought against him, including the custom house and dredging jobs. While not an eloquent speaker, Mr. Taylor certainly proved himself capable of making the best of the very bad news in which he finds himself.

Mr. Taplin, although taken by surprise, replied briefly, and in telling language criticized Mr. Taylor's speech and the actions of the government which he supported through thick and thin.

Mr. Brough followed, and devoted a considerable portion of his speech to an explanation of why he left the Reform ranks, an explanation chiefly remarkable for its omissions. He did not mention the refusal of the Reform party to accept him as a candidate, nor his resignation from the office of license inspector, nor did he enlighten his hearers as to the causes of that resignation. After getting a good start in his speech he mentioned the Regina scandal, from which he did not come down until the audience were tired.

The Farmersville orchestra rendered splendid music at intervals. The meeting closed in the usual manner, and we fancy Mr. Taylor must have felt much depressed at the ear-splitting cheers for Blake and Britton, and at the preponderance of Reformers present.

The spring amusees are to open in Brockville on Friday, 19th March. Judge Rose presiding.

A Devil's Lake, Dakota, despatch dated the 10th inst., says that the body of Mrs. Edward Walters, who disappeared a few days since, has been found near Devil's Lake. Mr. Walters' wife is thought to have become alarmed at his absence and started to go to her nearest neighbors. Her body was discovered a short distance from the road upon the open prairie, partly covered by snow, and only about a quarter of a mile from her own door. The snow about the spot where she lay indicated that she had walked about in a small circle for a long time. The blizzard last week was the severest of the longest winter known for many years, and reports are coming in every day of lives lost in the storm. The total of those in Dakota this winter can hardly be below the death figures of the Vermont railroad accident, while a large number will suffer permanently from the freezing of parts of the body.

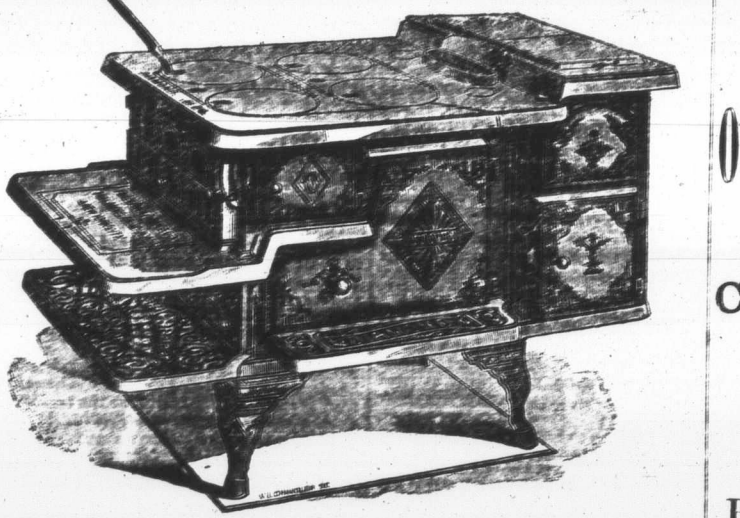
