At the Conservative convention in Brockville on Tuesday, Mr. A. E. Donovan was unanimously selected to contest Brockville riding at the elections on Dec. 11.

The line connecting Addison and Mallorytown rural telephone systems will be completed in about two weeks. This is a temporary arrangement and will be succeeded in the spring by a trunk line.

At the Conservative convention held at Delta on Friday, J. R. Dargavel, the former member, secured the nomination over Messrs. Harvey and Berry. The vote stood 192 Dargavel, 100 Harvey, and 42 Berry.

Miss Mary Derbyshire, granddaughter of Senator and Mrs. Derbyshire, Brockville, will be one of the debutantes at the drawing room to be held on the 18th of November by the Royal Highness the Duke of Connaught.

A conference of the Holiness Movement of Smith's Falls District will be held in the Holiness Church there, commencing on Friday Nov. 10th, and continuing for several days. Rev. R. C. Horner head of the Holiness Movement in Ontario will have charge of the services.

The death occurred on Monday at Oak Leaf of George Godkin, one of the oldest and best known farmers of that district. Mr. Godkin spent his whole life there and in his declining days lived with his nephew, Charles Murphy. He was unmarried. The only surviving member of the family is one brother, John Godkin, of Oak Leaf.

Brockville business men are meeting this evening to decide upon the date for their fair and have in mind Thursday, Dec. 7, which would be the same day of the same week as last year. Farther west, large flocks of turkeys are reported, but in this district the big offering of last year will hardly be exceeded. As usual, an effort will be made to secure the attendance of American buyers at the Athens fair. Last year the outside buyers expressed themselves as well satisfied with the treatment they were accorded here.

Cheese sold at 13 1/2¢ for white and 18 1/2¢ for colored on Brockville board last Thursday. This difference in price caused combination salesmen to withhold their offerings.

The Liberals of Brockville riding will meet in convention at Brockville on Monday next at 1.30 for general business and the selection of a candidate for the provincial elections.

Next Sunday is to be observed as World's Temperance Sunday and a union meeting is to be held in the Presbyterian church at 2.30. The programme will be in charge of the W.C.T.U.

At the auction sale last Thursday, offers for the realty of the estate of the late B. Lovern failed to reach the reserved figure. The property was subsequently purchased by G. F. Donnelley.

Mr. J. Shepley Rowsam returned last week from his extensive farm at Brock, Sask. On the way back home he passed through snowdrifts so deep that an extra engine had to be added to draw the train through.

Because of the many complaints which were made last July in connection with the system of holding matriculation examinations during that month it has been decided by the Ontario Education department that hereafter the examinations will be held about a month earlier.

This is what might be called "going the whole hog" in the stealing business.

The Athens Branch of the Woman's Institute held their meeting in the Town hall on Saturday, Oct. 28. Bread and cake making were discussed in general. Mrs. G. W. Beach instructed the Institute how to grow bulbs successfully. Miss May Berney furnished the musical numbers, which consisted of an instrumental solo, also a vocal, Mrs. W. G. Parish, being accompanist.

At the regular meeting of the Iroquois village council on Monday evening of last week a petition signed by 93 ratepayers was presented praying that permission be granted to "sell spirituous and fermented liquor," or in other words, repeal the present local option by-law in force there for the past three years. The petition was not properly drawn up and Iroquois will be "dry" for another year at least.

Mr. Harris Hunt of Athens has valuable feldspar mining prospects on the 14th concession of Bedford and is desirous of forming a company for their development. The outcroppings has been examined and reported upon by three members of the Geological Survey Department, Ottawa, and all pronounce the mineral to be of excellent quality. From the Rideau it is only a short two miles, making shipment, easy. All enquiries as to this mining proposition will be answered by Mr. Hunt.

A number of boys (or young men), having failed to take full advantage of Halloween, have since been disporting themselves in a very unbecoming way and a continuance of their disorderly conduct will bring them serious trouble. Last week three store windows on Main street were destroyed and a section of sidewalk was overturned. The names of four of the offenders are known to the Chief. At the Council meeting on Monday night the matter came up for consideration. It was decided not to prosecute at present, but to place the boys, in a sense, under suspended sentence, and if any further mischief is worked to proceed with the case. This action should serve to constitute the quartette a vigilance committee for the maintenance of law and order.
