SCANDAL FOLLOWS ON SCAN-DAL'S TRAIL.

Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper is now gunning after John B. Charleson, Mr. Tarte's supervisor of public works, who built the telegraph line from the Alaska boundary to Dawson, and who left Ottawa early this spring on another telegraph job just when his presence was so much needed to explain accounts in connection with his first exploit. A number of allegations were putlined in parliament by Sir Charles Hibbert Tupper in regard to which he desired to know if the government would bring down the papers. Summarized, they are as follows:-That on two sections of line they purchased a number of poles at a fair price and piled them along the rivers, on the route, above highwater mark, but instead, of using them the wire was strung on trees. This created such a scandal among the men that on the third section pole's were used. That A. Boyer, his assistant, who was supposed to receive \$150 a month, was really getting from some unknown source. That Charleson fills the offices along the line with foreigners as telegraph operators. That he places his orders in Vancouver with merchants who agree to pay his nephew, Percy Charleson, five per cent. commission. That he has made purchase of thousands of dollars' worth of material in the United States, to the detriment of Canadian citizens. That he had the expenses of his son paid to Ottawa, although he was not a public employee. That Charleson gives contracts without tender to his foreman, who was brought into the country at the public expense.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier replied that some of the enquiries for documents appeared to be all right, but others were not so. As for the charges of dishonesty against Mr. Charleson, he did not believe them, because he had known nim for 25 years, and always knew him to be an honest man.

THE BOXERS.

The great powers propose to occupy Pekin, the imperial capital of China, and force the Government to crush the Boxer movement, which is making a crusade against everybody and everything foreign in the Celestial Empire. What the outcome of the trouble will be it is impossible to even foreshadow, but if it does not result in the partition of China it will simply be because of the jealousy which The Chinese Society of Boxers con-

stitutes in reality a great clan of murderers, estimated to contain in its ranks over 11,000,000 semi-barbarians, well organized, and as savage in their fanaticism as the Soudan dervishes. The society was originally formed with the beneficent intention of protecting honest men ir China from bandits. It was called Ta Tao Hwri, which means, "The Society of the Great Sword," a title which seems to have been changed at a conparatively recent date to the more familiar name which so often appears in our news-

papers just now. When and where the clan originated is not certain. The natives refer to it as an "ancient" society, but that may mean 10 years or 100. It is agreed that at first its prinsiples were laudable and its work good, but as i became more powerful and increased in numbers many dishonest and designing persons entered it for the prestige and protection it accorded, just as designing persons ally themselves with influential bodies in other lands to-day.

These men proved a disturbing element, and in many cases directed the efforts of the society against their personal enemies, whom they represented as bandits and lawless persons. Terrified by persecution the innocent persons looked around for protection and discovered it in the Christian missionaries. It is said they professed conversion. At any rate, it seems to be clear that the missionaries succeeded in protecting them, and thus intensified the feeling which has always existed in China against Christian evangelists.
