W. J. Bennett, of the Legislature, has certainly made a mess of it. They didn't take the advice of the game commissioner. What was the good of appointing that game commissioner? The Government said they weren't going to bother with petitions or anything else but they would adopt the recommendation of the game commissioner which they appointed and this is the way they have done so. The game commissioner recommended six weeks' quail shooting and the Government only gives four weeks.

W. D. Tristram—I don't care much what they do. I'll get my share of quail anyway. I think that the amendment, however, is made for those rich sportsmen who can take a week any time and come down here from Toronto.

Joe. Oldershaw—The amendment favors the rich man with nothing to do and discriminates against the poor workman who has to steal a day off when he wants to go shooting. Cutting short the season will deprive many a poor man who enjoys shooting from getting a day's sport. The season is all right but the time should be extended till December 15.

A. C. McKay—The Government with their amendment have cut off the two best weeks of quail shooting. The reduction from the 15th of October till November the first was a good move, as the birds have not attained their growth and then are small and young, but the cutting of the last two weeks off the open season was a mistake. I think. These are the two weeks when the birds are in their prime. Having fasted for two months on weed seeds in the stubble, the quail then are fat, plump and in excellent condition for the table. Another mistake was the granting of permission to shoot rabbits. There is no doubt but that parties will go out sensibly to shoot rabbits but who will in reality shoot myself. I know it. I was a boy once myself, but the boys won't be the only offenders.
