Takes the Campbell Action From the Jury and Dismisses the Same

Other Dologs at the Present Sitting of the High Court Noted.

When the court opened this morning, Nesbitt, K. C., acting on behalf of the defendants in Campbell vs. C. P. R. Co. moved that the action be dismissed on the grounds that the plaintiffs had no eye witness to the accident and could not show how Campbell had met his death; also on grounds that does not come within the statute, in as much as it is a train which is put on the road for the convenience of the company alone, is not required by law, and therefore the company does not insure the public against ac-cidents which may occur in connec-tion with a train of this description. His Lordship, after hearing the arguments, took the case from the jury and dismissed the action without costs. Douglas and Hellmuth for plaintiff, Nesbitt for defendants.

The case of Thos. K. Carter vs. the S. Hadley Co. was then proceeded with. The plaintiff was permanently injured while working at a jointer In the defendants' factory and he has brought suit for \$2,500 damages. Had the break-up come suddenly there is no doubt but that there would have been a record-breaking flood. As it is, the water is going away nicely and, having begun to fall in London last evening, a fall here may be looked for and the river will soon be at its usual level.
