SAY FOOD BOARD CUTTING PRICES

Carleton and Victoria Potato Growers Complain of Toronto Representative Bringing Manitoba Potatoes in at \$1.65 Per Bag.

A resolution passed at a meeting of the potato growers and shippers of the counties of Carleton and Victoria held at Florenceville, follows:

"Whereas, we understand the representative of the Canada Food Board in the city of Toronto has become active in the purchase and sale of Manitoba potatoes in competition with the growers and shippers of potatoes in this province and are offering potatoes at one dollar and sixty-five cents per bag of ninety pounds delivered in Toronto—a price which would allow or net the growers of potatoes in this province only two dollars per barrel, and

Whereas, the cost of growing and marketing potatoes this season will average at least three dollars per barrel of one hundred and sixty-five pounds f.o.b. cars at shipping points, this action of the Canada Food Board, if continued, will cause a serious loss to the potato growers of this province, and so discourage the farmers as to seriously reduce the production of this valuable article of food.

We feel that the action of your Toronto representative is not in accordance with the purposes for which your board was created, and consider it a discrimination against the potato growing provinces of Canada. We respectfully petition your board to cause the action of your Toronto representative to be discontinued.

With a record crop of ten million bushels in Manitoba, and a big crop in New Brunswick to offset a somewhat smaller crop than usual in Ontario and some other parts of Canada, the total yield of potatoes this year promises to be above that of 1917, according to reports received by the Department of Agriculture from all parts of the Dominion. The New Brunswick crop is estimated at 8,650,000 bushels, as compared with but five million bushels last year. With a smaller acreage, Prince Edward Island will have

as good a crop as last year, and Nova Scotia and Quebec will have good average crops.

SPANISH "FLUE" AT HARTLAND

One house in Hartland is under quarantine for Spanish influenza and it is considered that there has been one other case, now well on toward recovery.

On Monday Dean Hammond arrived from Orono, whether he had gone last week to commence his second year at the University of Maine. He was a very sick lad upon his arrival here and was one of 40 sent away from the college as suspected cases of influenza. Upon his arrival Dr. Curtis was at once summoned and he pronounced the case an aggravated form of the real genuine grip. In his capacity as chairman of the County Board of Health the house was placed under strict quarantine. Mr. Hammond's condition this morning is reported no worse.

Dr. Curtis considers that Kenneth Thornton, now recovering from a light attack of pneumonia, has in all probability had an attack of what is popularly termed "Spanish influenza," which is no other disease than the severe type of la grippe that swept the country in 1889.

It is the duty of every person to avoid contact with infected persons or premises. The disease is not air-borne, but contagious by direct infection.

There is likelihood that throughout the province a general system of precautionary measures will be established. Schools, churches and all public assemblages will be closed if the disease becomes more alarming. And such an order may be issued by the provincial Board of Health any moment.

Grand Falls Girl Dies of Spanish Influenza

J. P. Kelley of Grand Falls received a telegram Wednesday morning informing him of his daughter's death of Spanish influenza at the Providence, Rhode Island, hospital where she was training for a nurse. Miss Bertha Kelly was well known all over the county, having been for a number of years with the Wade Drug company. She was in the last year of training, and about 30 years of age and much liked by a large circle of relatives and friends.
