After trimming the Houlton Reds in two games here on the holiday, the Pets went to Houlton yesterday and got a 9 to 1 trimming, which shows that consistency is one of the jewels the local baseballists are not.

Nine games in nine days is too much for a club carrying the number the salary limit allows in the New Brunswick & Maine League and that fact together with the troubles of the pitching staff is mainly responsible for the deplorable showing made by the Pets in the past nine days. Boston Monopoly of Players to First Reach the Century Mark.

With the spell of warm weather, the hitting in the National League continues to improve, and this week there are 30 men in the honor list.

Zimmerman of Chicago continues to lead all comers, but has dropped a few points. He has managed, however, to keep his figures at 405, which is four points higher than Mike Donlin, who did some great work with the hickory for the few days he was in the game after his short layoff.

"Chief" Meyers of the New York Giants has kept on going, now having .384 for a mark and keeping a small margin over Johnny Bates, who has not done much playing since the Red Birds were here in Boston.

Bill Sweeney of the Braves follows in fifth place, and seems likely to be the first man in the National League to make 100 hits. He has a good margin over the others, already having hit the ball safely 98 times, so that Boston, with Sweeney in the National League, and Speaker in the American League, will have the distinction of providing the men who first touch the "century" in their respective circles.
